## Tennessee State Parks Provide 7 New All-Terrain Wheelchairs

Tennessee State Parks today announced the availability of new all-terrain wheelchairs at seven state parks, enhancing accessibility for visitors and bringing the total of parks with the wheelchairs to 12.

The announcement is especially timely at Cummins Falls State Park, which has a new 3,600 sq. ft. ADA accessible overlook at the end of the .4-mile

Falls Overlook Trail. Non-electric wheelchairs can also access the overlook.

The announcement of the seven wheelchairs comes on the same day as Disability Advocacy Day in Tennessee.

"We are delighted to offer this service," said Greer Tidwell, deputy commissioner of Conservation for the Tennessee Department of Environment

and Conservation (TDEC). "We intend to serve every person who wants to visit our parks, and we are dedicated to making the experience the best it can be for everyone. We are grateful to Governor Bill Lee and the Tennessee General Assembly for the funding to make this happen."

Angel Colon, 34, Kagley Drive Lenoir City, was charged with Violation of Bond Restriction.

Stevie Colon, 37, Kagley Drive Lenoir City, was charged with Domestic Assault.

Deputy Ezell LCSO, responded to Kagley Drive for reports of a physical domestic. When Deputy arrived at the scene, he observed a male identified as Angel Colon (offender/victim) standing at the end of the driveway. While speaking with Mr. Colon he made the following summarized statements. Mr. Colon stated his wife Stevie Colon (offender) assaulted him and he had proof. Mr. Colon stated he was in his bedroom with his son when Ms. Colon entered the bedroom and started a verbal argument. Mr. Colon stated the argument moved to the Livingroom and while in the Livingroom, Ms. Colon threw an ashtray and flower vase at him. Mr. Colon did show the deputy a video on his

phone. On the video, the deputy observed Ms. Colon pick up and throw a flower vase at Mr. Colon. Deputy then Spoke with Ms. Colon. Ms. Colon stated she was sitting in the living room when Mr. Colon entered the living room and started the verbal argument. into custody and transported to the Loudon County Detention Facility by Deputy Kirkland. While en route to the facility Mr. Colon stated to Deputy Kirkland that the video he had shown to the deputies was fake and he did not want to press charges.

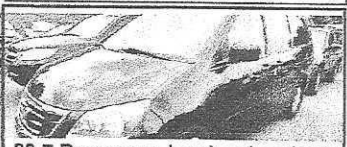

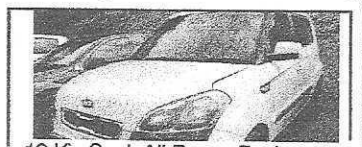

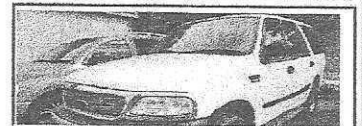

"We must remove barriers for everyone with disabilities, and these all-terrain wheelchairs are an important step for our parks," said Rep. Sam Whitson, R-Franklin, who introduced the resolution declaring today as Disability Advocacy Day. "We want all Tennesseans to enjoy our parks, and the wheelchairs are just one way to show that commitment."

The wheelchairs announced today follow the availability of wheelchairs at Radnor Lake State Park, Tims Ford State Park, Lamar Alexander Rocky Fork State

Park, Henry Horton State Park, and Booker T. Washington State Park.

All-terrain wheelchairs are designed to navigate a wide range of terrains. They give visitors with limited mobility the opportunity to access and enjoy outdoor recreation that might otherwise be inaccessible. The chairs are free to the public and available for both children and adults. They can be operated independently and offer the option of allowing caretaker control.

It is possible to request an all-terrain chair upon arrival at a park, but it may already be reserved for another guest, so visitors are asked to give advance notice of the need for a chair. TDEC is working to expand access to all-terrain wheelchairs in parks across the state.

Governor Lee has stated the goal of having the "most accessible park system in the nation." He and the General

Assembly appropriated over \$1.2 million for all-terrain wheelchairs to be placed in the parks system, along with \$1.6 million to make improvements to trail accessibility.

**Older Adults Now Able to Receive Additional Dose of Updated COVID-19 Vaccine**

CDC Director Mandy Cohen endorsed the CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices' (ACIP) recommendation for adults ages 65 years and older to receive an additional updated 2023-2024 COVID-19 vaccine dose. The recommendation acknowledges the increased risk of severe disease from COVID-19 in older adults, along with the currently available data on vaccine effectiveness.

Previous CDC recommendations ensured that people who are immunocompromised are already eligible

for additional doses of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Data continues to show the importance of vaccination to protect those most at risk for severe outcomes of COVID-19. An additional dose of the updated COVID-19 vaccine may restore protection that has waned since a fall vaccine dose, providing increased protection to adults ages 65 years and older.

Adults 65 years and older are disproportionately impacted by COVID-19, with more than half of COVID-19 hospitalizations during October 2023 to December 2023 occurring in this age group.

CDC and ACIP will continue to monitor COVID-19 vaccine safety and effectiveness. CDC continues to recommend that everyone stay up to date on their COVID-19 vaccines, especially people see CDC ctd. pg. 7

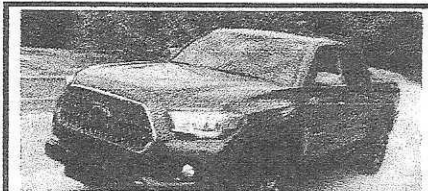

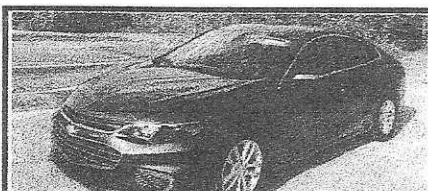

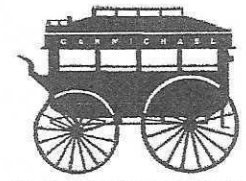
