

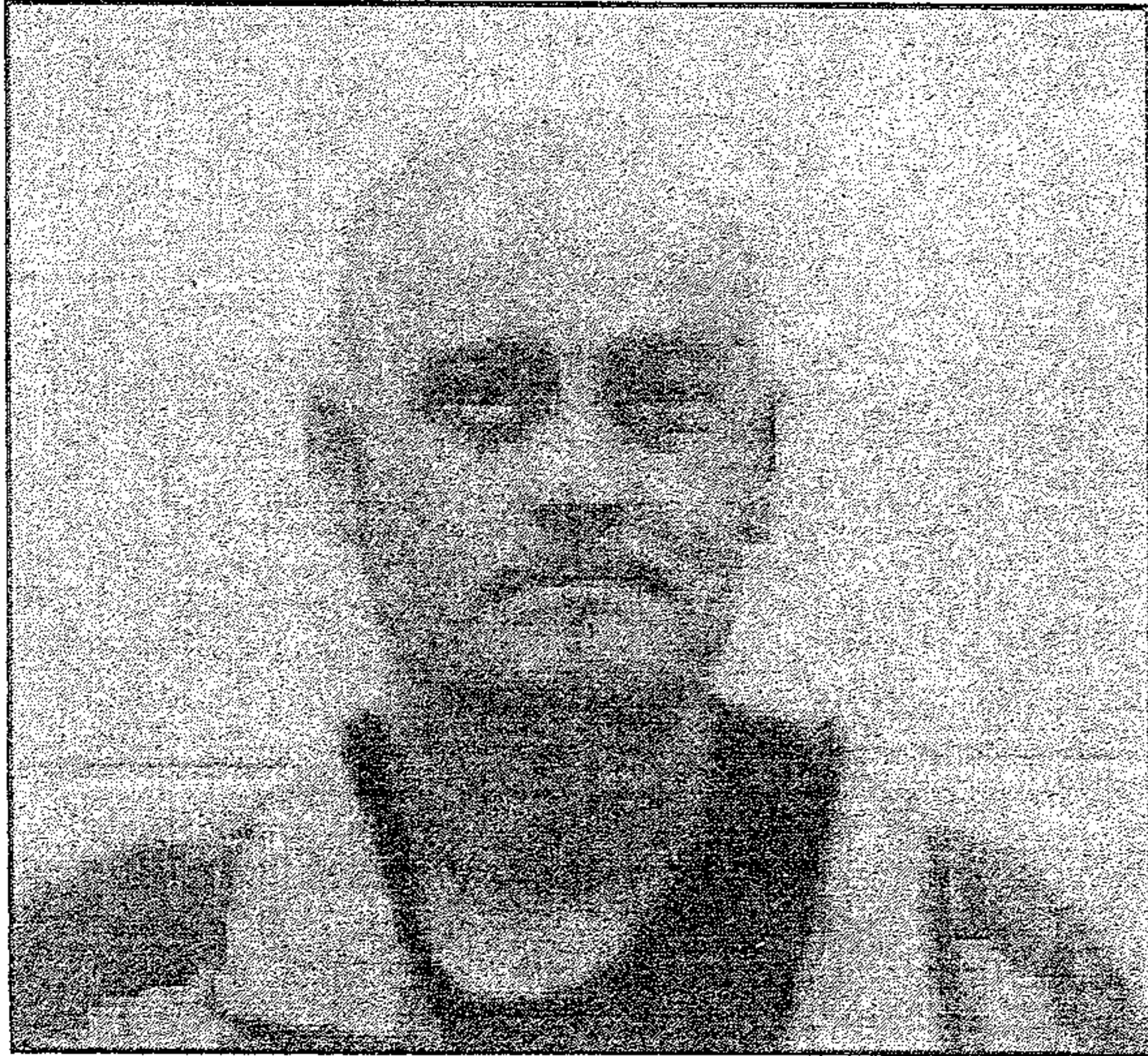

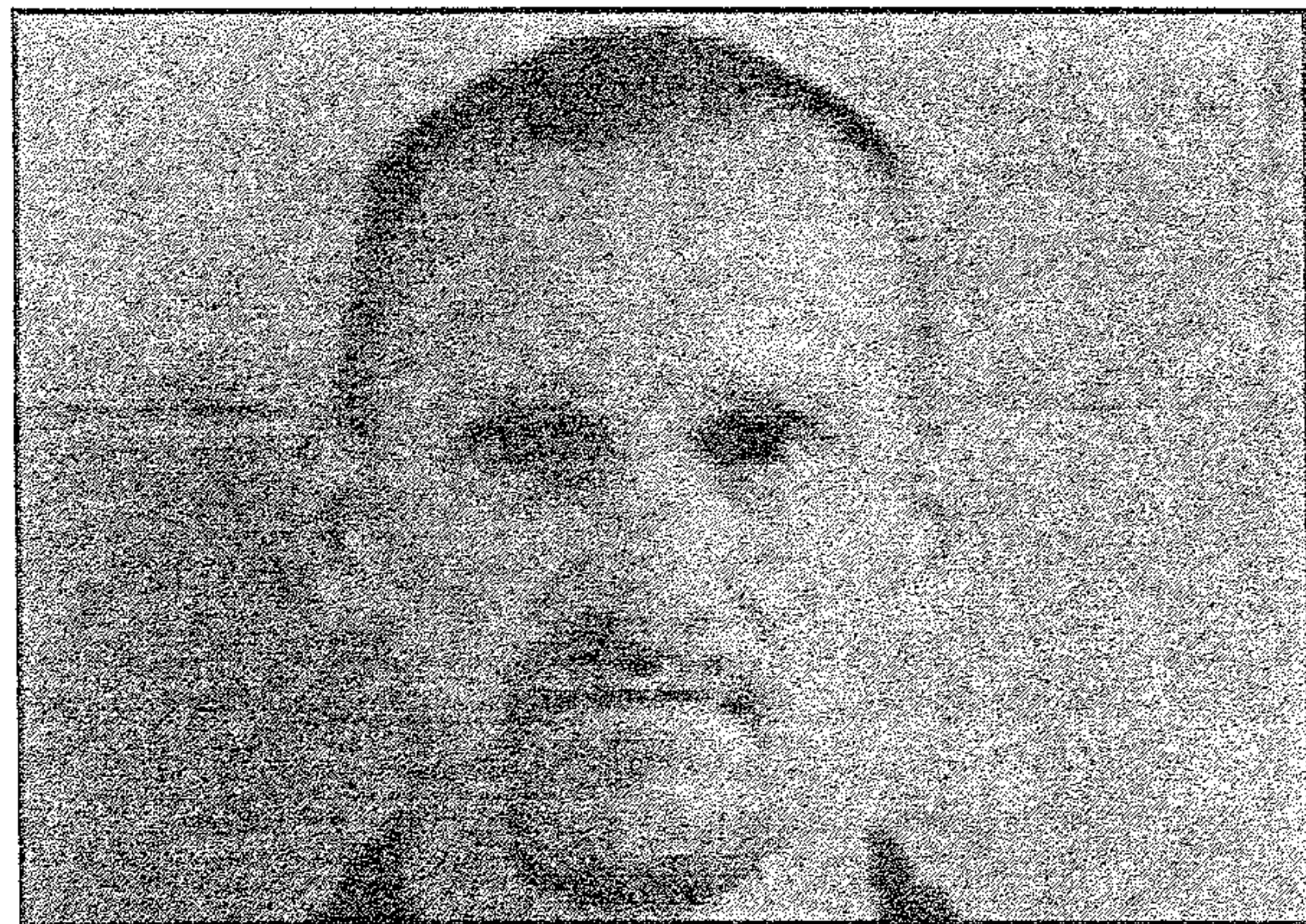
Officer R. Miller LCPD, observed

SPOOFED INTERNET DOMAINS AND EMAIL ACCOUNTS POSE CYBER AND DISINFORMATION RISKS TO VOTERS

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) are issuing this announcement to help the public recognize and avoid spoofed election-related internet domains and email accounts during the 2020 election year.

Spoofed domains and email accounts are leveraged by foreign

actors and cybercriminals and can be easily mistaken for legitimate websites or emails. Adversaries can use spoofed domains and email accounts to disseminate false information; gather valid usernames, passwords, and email addresses; collect personally identifiable information; and spread malware, leading to further compromises and

potential financial losses.

Cyber actors set up spoofed domains with slightly altered characteristics of legitimate domains. A spoofed domain may feature an alternate spelling of a word ("electon" instead of "election"), or use an alternative top-level

Two Knoxville Residents Charged In Federal Complaint With Conspiracy To Distribute Fentanyl, Heroin, And Methamphetamine

Recently, the United States Attorney's Office filed a federal complaint charging two individuals, Michael Allen Hill, 45, and Heavyn Breanne Thomas, 23, both from Knoxville, TN, with conspiracy to distribute 400 grams or more of a mixture and substance containing a detectable amount of fentanyl, a Schedule II controlled substance, one kilogram or more of a mixture and substance containing a detectable amount of heroin, a Schedule I controlled substance, and 50 grams or more of methamphetamine, a Schedule II controlled substance. A trial date has not been set.

into handcuff, and a search of the vehicle, due to a baggie with white residue sitting in plain view. When ask Luallen stated it was crack, and there was a crack rock where he was sitting in the vehicle. Located in the driver side floorboard was .04 grams of a hard white rock substance that tested positive for cocaine. There was a crack pipe located between the driver seat and center console that belonged to Luallen. Located in the passenger seat was 2 marijuana grinder with residue belonging to Lisa Stinnett, who also had a crack pipe on her person. Luallen also had suspended license. Both were placed un-

der arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

If convicted of this drug trafficking conspiracy, the defendants face mandatory minimum terms of imprisonment of 10 years and up to life, at least five years of supervised release, a fine of up to \$10,000,000, any applicable forfeiture, and a \$100 special assessment.

The investigation was conducted by the Knox County Sheriff's Office Narcotics Unit and the Organized Retail Crime Unit, HIDTA's Drug Related Death Task

Force, and the Knox County Regional Forensics Center. On September 23, 2020, during the execution of a search warrant, officers, assisted by the Knox County Sheriff's Office SWAT team,

seized approximately 972 grams of a brown powdery substance of suspected heroin, 603 grams of a white powdery block-like substance suspected to be a heroin-fentanyl mixture, 865 grams

of suspected crystal methamphetamine, multiple firearms, drug paraphernalia, and \$51,950 in U.S. currency. Assistant U.S. Attorney Brent N. Jones will represent the United States.

Joseph C. Gonzales Sentenced For Conspiracy To Distribute Methamphetamine And Possession Of A Firearm

Joseph C. Gonzales, 40, currently of Tazewell, was sentenced to 16 years in prison for participation in a drug dealing conspiracy by the Honorable Thomas A. Varlan, in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Tennessee at Knoxville.

Gonzales pleaded guilty to an indictment charging him with one count of conspiracy to distribute 50 grams or more of methamphetamine in violation of 21 U.S.C. § 846 and 841(a)(1); and one count of possession of a firearm in furtherance of a drug trafficking crime, in violation of 18 U.S.C. 924(c). Gonzales was sentenced to 192 months in prison to be followed by 5 years' supervised release.

Gonzales was part of a large-scale drug trafficking organization operating primarily

in Claiborne and Knox counties. The investigation determined that individuals were obtaining kilogram quantities of methamphetamine from unknown individuals and then redistributing that methamphetamine in the Knox and Claiborne counties of Tennessee. Gonzales admitted to obtaining approximately 6 ki-Meth ctd. pg. 7

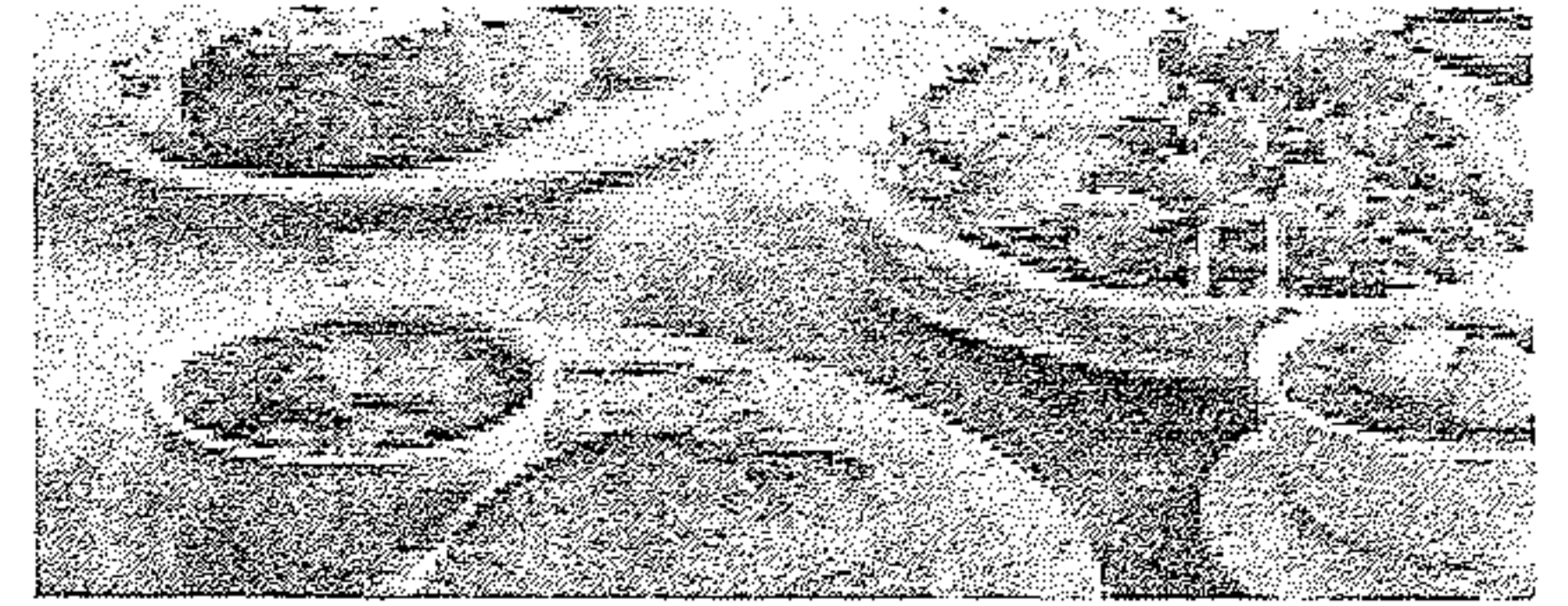

domain, such as a “[.]com” version of a legitimate “[.]gov” website. Members of the public could unknowingly visit spoofed domains while seeking information regarding the 2020 election. Additionally, cyber actors may use a seemingly legitimate email account to entice the public into clicking on malicious files or links.

The FBI and CISA urge all members of the American public to critically evaluate the websites they visit and the emails sent to their personal and business email accounts, to seek out reliable and verified information on election information.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Verify the spelling of web addresses, websites, and email addresses that look trustworthy but may be close imitations of legitimate election websites.

Seek out information from

trustworthy sources, verifying who produced the content and considering their intent. The Election Assistance Commission (<https://www.eac.gov>) provides a vast amount of verified information and resources.

Ensure operating systems and applications are updated to the most current versions.

Update anti-malware and anti-virus software and conduct regular network scans.

Do not enable macros on documents downloaded from an email unless absolutely necessary, and only then, after ensuring the file is not malicious.

Disable or remove unneeded software applications.

Use strong two-factor authentication if possible, via biometrics, hardware tokens, or authentication apps.

Do not open e-mails or attachments from unknown individuals. Do not communicate with unsolicited e-mail senders.

Never provide personal information of any sort via e-mail. Be aware that many e-mails requesting your personal information appear to be legitimate.

The FBI is responsible for investigating and prosecuting election crimes, malign foreign influence operations, and malicious cyber activity targeting election infrastruc-

ture and other U.S. democratic institutions. CISA helps critical infrastructure owners and operators, including those in the election community, remain resilient against physical and cyber threats. The FBI and CISA provide services and information to uphold the security, integrity, and resiliency of U.S. elec-

lograms of methamphetamine and to purchasing a firearm to protect those drugs in the summer of 2018. A co-conspirator, an inmate incarcerated in the Tennessee Department of Corrections, using a contract band cell phone, coordinated the delivery of the 6 kilograms of methamphetamine recovered from Gonzales. In total, 21 individuals were indicted in connection with this investigation, and all have now entered guilty pleas and been sentenced. The investigation, which began in July 2017, resulted in the seizure of more than 6.5 kilograms of actual methamphetamine, numerous firearms, and U.S. currency.

The criminal indictment resulted from an investigation by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, the Claiborne County Sheriff's Office, the 8th Judicial District Drug Task Force, the Knoxville Police Department, the Tazewell Police Department, the Tennessee Highway Patrol, and the

Drug Enforcement Administration.


Assistant United States Attorney Caryn L. Hebets represented the United States.

The investigation is a result of the Department of Justice's Organized Crime and Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) program, the centerpiece of the Department of Justice's drug supply reduction strategy. OCDETF was established in 1982 to conduct comprehensive, multi-level

attacks on major drug trafficking and money laundering organizations. Today, OCDETF combines the resources and expertise of its member federal agencies in cooperation with state and local law enforcement. The principal mission of the OCDETF program is to identify, disrupt, and dismantle the most serious drug trafficking and money laundering organizations and those primarily responsible for the nation's drug supply.
