and the utility board were open for business to the public once again. He also reported the parks and pool are slated to open May 30th barring any further orders from the Governor. All salons, nail places, tattoo shops and sun-tanning places are back up and open as well the mayor stated. Mayor Aikens also highlighted the downtown area where so much has been done and before this event there were 12 new businesses already. He encouraged everyone to shop downtown as much as possible because not only did the city contribute to the downtown project a lot of those owners paid out of their own pockets to help revitalize and renew the downtown area with great success.

Loudon Mayor Jeff Harris addressed the public next to let all the citizens of Loudon know they were also open to the public as well as the utility board but they were still encouraging citizens to use the drive and practice social distancing as well. The parks in Loudon will remain closed at this time however the trails and restrooms will be open for use. Highland Avenue paving will begin and should be completed by the end of June in Loudon so expect some delay while this construction is going on.

Loudon County Mayor Buddy Bradshaw stated he was very proud of how Loudon County as a whole has responded to this Pandemic and that was the primary reason for our low numbers. Mayor Bradshaw also stated all the county offices including the county clerks office was open but the annex was utilizing social distance practices by only allowing so many to be in the building at one time. For those reasons citizens are encouraged to use online resources as much as possible. Mayor Bradshaw concluded

by encouraging everyone to shop local because these are the people hurt the most, which was echoed by the other mayors as well, #shop-local.

## Taxes

Questions posed to the mayors included how this will affect the budgets and particularly property taxes. Mayor Aikens stated the City of Lenoir City was in a very strong place and were fortunate to have enough reserved funds to cover most of the losses during this time and with things opening back he expects things to get back very quickly. The same was echoed by Mayor Harris who also stated the city of Loudon was also using its reserves and there would be no need for a tax increase. Mayor Buddy Bradshaw stated the subject of a possible tax increase had not even been discussed by any of the commissioners so he saw no need for it either at this time.

Mayor Aikens also reported the constructions project at Highway 321 and Highway 11 was coming along very well and all lanes are currently flowing. The City received a 2 million dollar grant for technological upgrades associated with the project and will also include downtown as well. The grant also includes the synchronization of the red lights as well, so hopefully they will have someone who actually lives here help with it so it will be reflective of the traffic flow we all know who live here. Mayor Harris stated they had received the same grant to do the same thing and the Highland Avenue paving project was set to begin and be finished by the end of June.

Mayor Aikens gave an update on the new Fire-hall being built downtown and stated it was on track to be completed by the end of

June and there was a ribbon cutting scheduled for July 9th. Also downtown Mayor Aikens addressed the new splash-pad project. While the Lenoir City Playground and Pool are slated to open May 30 the splash-pad should be started within the next 30-45 days with a completion date expected in August. Mayor Harris reported the Loudon Pool and splash-pad won't be open in May and will let everyone know as soon as possible.

Mayor Buddy Bradshaw further stated he had received numerous calls about the Highway 11 Yard Sale

this Weekend and is happy to report the sale will go on as planned throughout Loudon County and that numerous businesses had reached out as well and they will be open for the sale.

Jimmie Haynes, 71, Hickory Creek Road Lenoir City, was charged with DUI, and Allowing Animals to run at Large. Deputy Cody Bengel LCSO, responded to Sugarlimb Road in reference to cows out. Deputy arrived on scene and made contact with the victim, who had about 15-20 cows in her front yard. Victim stated the cows belong to Jimmie Haynes. After checking with dispatch this was the 7th time this year that deputies responded to this address for cows out. Dispatch advised Haynes would respond to the scene. Deputy was on scene for over an hour and still no contact with Haynes. Deputy left the scene and made contact with a blue vehicle stopped in the middle of the road with hazard lights on and speaking with Deputy Deland. Deputy Bengel made contact with the driver Jimmie Haynes. Deputy could smell a strong odor of alcohol coming from his person, and observed an open wine bottle in the passenger seat. While speaking with Haynes Deputy observed him to have slurred speech and ask to exit the vehicle. Haynes admitted to drinking the wine and taking Seroquel. Deputy located 1 open bottle of wine, 2 empty bottles of wine and 3 empty beer cans. Jimmie Haynes

was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

Robert Lindsey, 53, Paris Road Sweetwater, was charged with Public Intoxication. Officer Christopher Law LPD, was dispatch to Light House Pointe in reference to a male subject laying on the ground, later identified as Robert Lindsey.
