Victim stabs assailant in robbery attempt; charged by LPD

A Loudon man got a little more than he bargained for when he attempted to rob another Loudon man. During the attempted robbery the assailant was stabbed and later was found with the injuries by LPD's Brian Jenkins.

According to the report, Daniel Hardin, 23, Vale Street Loudon, was charged with Aggravated Assault, Aggravated Burglary, and Attempted



Stabbed

Aggravated Robbery.

According to witness statement and evidence it was determined that Daniel Hardin entered the home of the victim located on Summer Street in Loudon without consent by kicking the front door open. Hardin was armed with a two tone hand gun. Hardin threatened the victim with the gun while demanding he give him \$200.00. A struggle ensued as the victim tried to get Hardin out of the house. As Hardin was striking victim and holding the gun on him, victim picked up a steak knife to protect himself, and stabbed Hardin in the upper abdomen with it.

The victim did have injuries about his head and face consistent with being struck with the but of a gun. Hardin was unable to get money from the victim. Hardin left and made it back to Vale Street where residence called for an ambulance due to his injuries. Hardin would not tell who stabbed him.

Brian Jenkins Detective LPD, issued warrants. Once released from the hospital Daniel Hardin was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

Deputy believed Barnes was under the influence of a medication, and Barnes stated he was prescribed Xanex and had taken one earlier in the day.

Dispatch advised Deputy Barnes license were suspended out of Knox. County. Keegan Thress-Barnes was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.





"We are fortunate to house primary and secondary sources that provide accounts of past pandemics, such as the spread of influenza in 1918," says Adam H. Alfrey, senior curator at the Library's East Tennessee History Center. "More than a century later, these sources help us understand our past and present in meaningful ways."

Alfrey continues: "That is why we are inviting East Tennesseans to be a part of history. By sharing current stories, experiences, and other impressions, we can document and preserve how life has been impacted over the past months. We can also chronicle how our region has come together to support one another."

To date, area residents from 14 East Tennessee counties have submitted experiences. Additionally, the project's

partner, the Museum of East Tennessee History, is evaluating what artifacts to collect from the pandemic.

Temperature screening employees:

Best practice: employers to take temperatures onsite with a no-touch thermometer each

day upon arrival at work

Minimum: temperatures can be taken before arriving. Normal temperature should not exceed 100.4 degrees Fahrenheit

Direct any employee who exhibits COVID-19 symptoms (i.e., answers yes to any of the screening questions or who is running a fever) to leave the premises immediately and seek medical care and/or COVID-19 testing, per Tennessee Department of Health and CDC guidelines. Employers should maintain the confidentiality of employee health information.

Implement workplace cleaning and disinfection practices, according to CDC guidelines, with regular sanitization of high-touch surfaces at least every two hours

Mitigate exposure in the workplace by implementing social distancing guidelines and modify scheduling

Plan for potential COVID-19 cases, and work COVID-19 cases, deep clean facilities)
