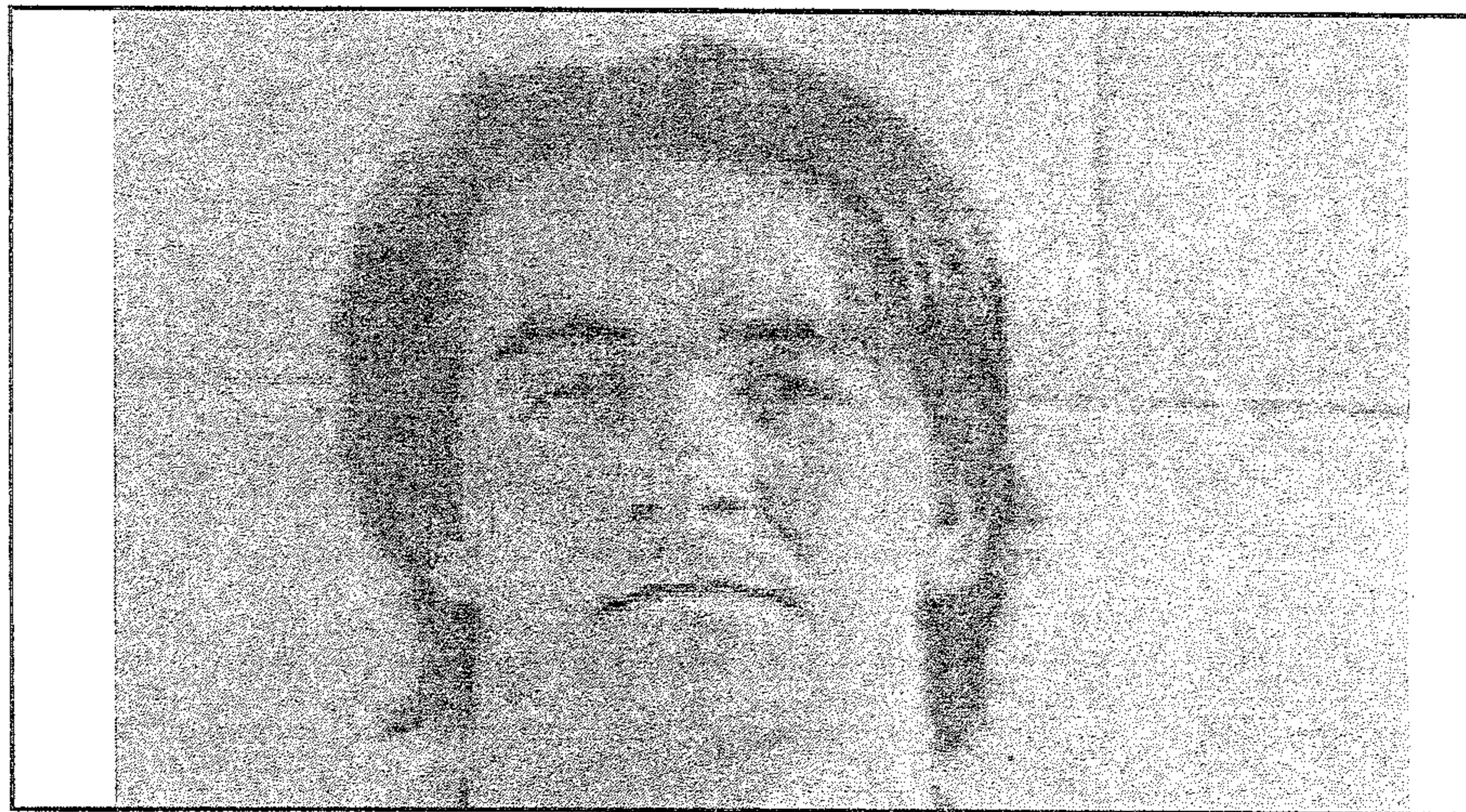

Tennessee Business Relief Program

On June 2, 2020, Governor Bill Lee announced the use of federal Coronavirus Relief Funds to assist Tennessee small businesses impacted by the COVID-19 crisis. Governor Lee has directed the Tennessee Department of Revenue to issue business relief payments through the Tennessee Business Relief Program to small

businesses for costs incurred as a result of mandatory business closures.

The department will publish details about the Tennessee Business Relief Program payment amounts and timing on this website in the coming days. Tennessee businesses that were closed via Executive Order are encouraged to update their mailing address-

Donations Will Help Keep Library Strong

Since their first meeting almost 50 years ago, the Friends of the Knox County Public Library have been committed to supporting the Knox County Public Library (KCPL) and its staff. That commitment continues today with the announcement of a community-wide

fundraising campaign to recoup some of the revenue lost when the Friends' Annual Used Book Sale and eight Branch and Special Sales were cancelled as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Friends hope to raise \$50,000 by June 30. Past and current Board members

U.S. ATTORNEY J. DOUGLAS OVERBEY ANNOUNCES \$79,292 AWARD TO ADDRESS COVID-19 PANDEMIC IN TENNESSEE

U.S. Attorney J. Douglas Overbey of the Eastern District of Tennessee today announced that the Blount County Sheriff's Office received \$79,292 in Department of Justice grants to respond to the public safety challenges posed by the outbreak of COVID-19.

The grant is available under the Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding

program, authorized by the recent stimulus legislation signed by President Trump. Other jurisdictions can determine if they are eligible for funds and may apply immediately by visiting this website.

The Justice Department is moving quickly, awarding grants on a rolling basis and aiming to have funds available for draw-down as soon as possible

after receiving applications.

"This is no time for anyone to let up in the fight against COVID-19, and law enforcement cannot let down its guard against the dangers it presents. I'm very pleased to announce this grant award to the BCSO for its use in properly equipping and protect-

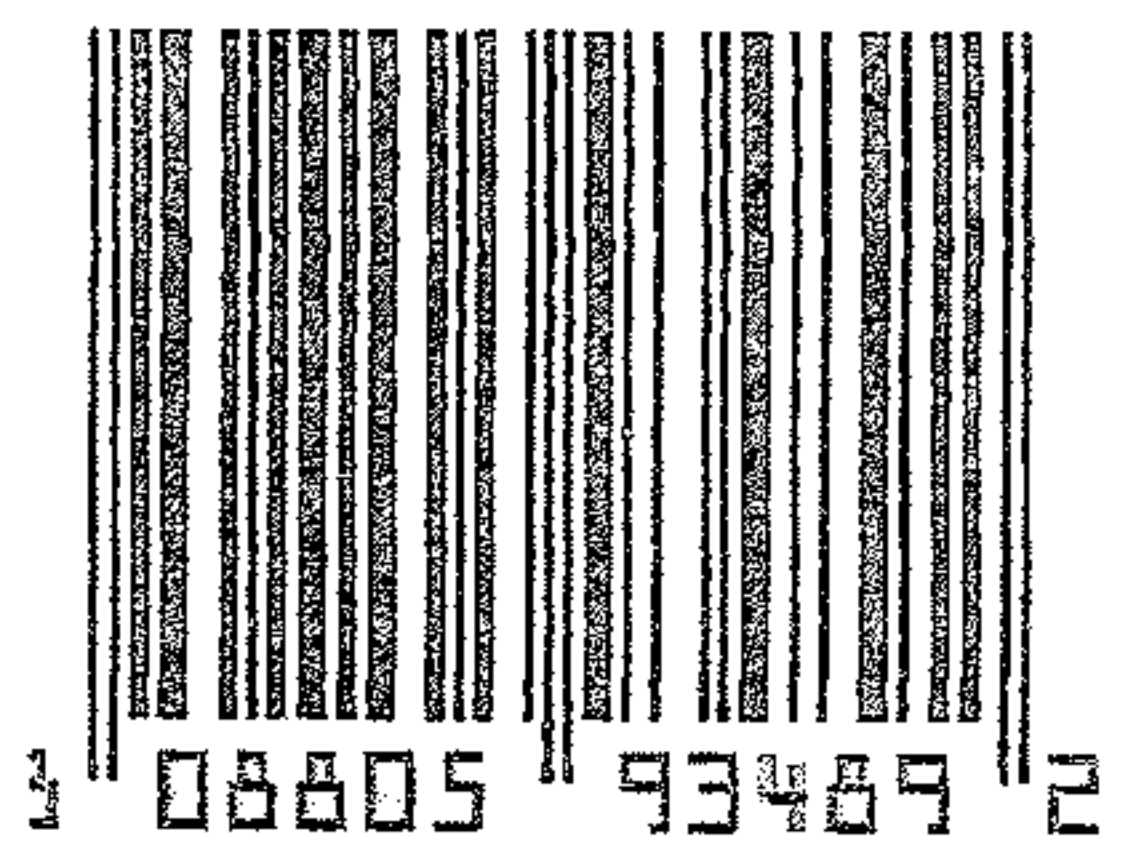

Parker Mosley, 24, Club-View Road Oxford, MS., was charged with DUI 2nd, Legend Drug, and Poss. Of Drug Para. Trooper B. Webb THP, was sitting at the 72 mm on I-75, when he received a BOLO on a black truck swerving all over the roadway, and ran the caller of the road. A black truck matching the description drove by Trooper. Upon Trooper observing the truck it could not maintain its lane of travel, and crossed over the shoulder several times. Trooper conducted a traffic stop at the 83 mm. Trooper ran the tag on the vehicle it matched the BOLO vehicle. Upon contact with the driver Parker Mosley, Trooper observed him to have red watery eyes and was shouting his name to the Trooper before he could ask. The driver stated that he had not been drinking. Trooper ask Mosley to perform sobriety test, which he performed poorly on. Trooper ask Mosley if he had anything illegal in the vehicle, he stated he had a THC cartridge in the glovebox, and a Xanax in his wallet. Mosley was placed under arrest and transported to the ER for blood draw then to the Loudon County Jail.

The following types of small businesses are eligible:

Barber shops, Museums, zoos, and other similar at-

tractions, Beauty shops, Amusement parks, Nail salons Bowling centers and arcades, Tattoo parlors, spas, and other personal care services, Marinas, Gyms and fitness centers Amusement, sports and recreational industries, Restaurants Promoters of performing arts, sports, and similar events, Bars Agents and managers of artists, athletes, and entertainers, Hotels and other travel accommodations Independent artists, writers, and performers, Theaters, auditoriums, performing arts centers and similar facilities

In addition, the following small businesses are eligible if their sales were reduced by at least 25%, as shown on their April sales tax returns (filed in May):

Furniture stores, Book stores, Home furnishing stores, Department stores, Clothing stores Office supply, stationery and gift stores, Shoe stores, Used merchandise stores, Jewelry, luggage, and leather goods stores Other miscellaneous stores, Sporting goods, hobby, and musical instrument stores.

ing its deputies as they continue to protect the citizens of Blount County," said U.S. Attorney J. Douglas Overbey.

"The outbreak of COVID-19 and the public health emergency it created are sobering reminders that even the most routine duties performed by our nation's public safety officials carry

potentially grave risks," said Katharine T. Sullivan, Principal Deputy Assistant Attorney General for the Office of Justice Programs. "These funds will provide hard-hit communities with critical resources to help mitigate the impact of this crisis and give added protection to the brave professionals charged with keeping citizens safe."

The law gives jurisdictions considerable latitude using these funds for dealing with COVID-19. Potential uses include hiring personnel, paying overtime, purchasing protective equipment, distributing resources to hard-hit areas and addressing inmates' medical needs.

Agencies eligible for the fiscal year 2019 State and

Local Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program are candidates for the emergency funding. Local units of government and tribes will receive direct awards separately according to their jurisdictions' allocations.

The Office of Justice Programs, directed by Principal Deputy Assistant Attorney General Katharine T. Sullivan, provides federal leadership, grants, training, technical assistance and other resources to improve the nation's capacity to prevent and reduce crime, assist victims and enhance the rule of law by strengthening the criminal and juvenile justice systems. 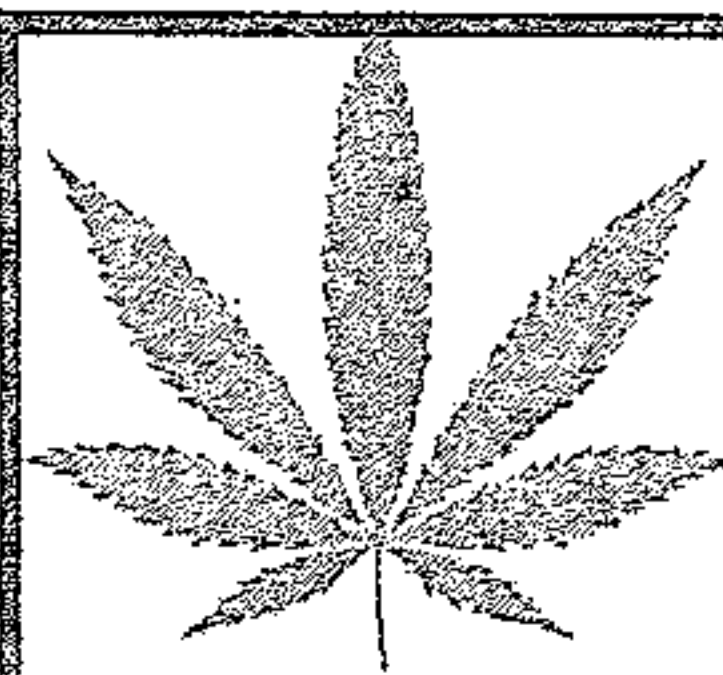
vices and programs that help ensure equity and empowerment.
