



on scene he made contact with the complainant, who stated her and her husband were driving on Dailey Ave when they saw a little girl walking in the roadway, and stated the little girl had a pee soaked diaper, and had a small sore on her bottom lip. Complainant made several attempts to locate a parent.

Cpl. B. Smith arrived on scene to find a twin boy sibling to the girl locked outside the residence, screaming and very scared of law enforcement. Cpl. Smith knocked on the door for 4 to 4 minutes before the father identified as Thomas Mika came to the door dazed from sleep. Deputy could smell a strong odor of an alcohol beverage on his person. Mika did state he had drank last night and did not know his kids were outside. Deputy ask Mika if he could inspect the home for living condition for the children for a DCS referral he agreed. On entering the residence Deputy did find a small baggie of marijuana on the counter in plain view in reach of the children. DTF DeBoer was called to the scene where several other narcotic items were located. Thomas Mika was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

Brown also made two additional posts to his Snapchat account which contained images depicting maps of the interior of West Town Mall and made an additional post which stated in part, "If we get 300 people we can raid the mall and everything in there...."

According to the complaint, Brown also posted instructions to others and updates of his own preparations for the riot via his Snapchat account. In one post, Brown instructed, "be there by 10:30, lace your shoes, wear masks and gloves. Bring hammers bricks whatever you want." In another post, Brown stated, "clique up before all y'all get active so we all show up at once [expletive] the waiting a hour on slow pokes clear your agenda if you comin. 10:30."

The complaint also alleges that, on May 31, Brown was observed by law enforcement officers participating in a civil disorder in the downtown area of Market Square. intent is to sow discord in our communities," said FBI Special-Agent-in-Charge Joseph E. Carrico.

This case is the result of an investigation conducted by the FBI Knoxville Field Office, with assistance from the Knoxville Police Department.

The charges in the complaint are merely accusations, and the defendant is presumed innocent unless and until proven guilty.

DUI

Sylvia Hanley, 50. Lyn-Wood Drive Greenback, was charged with DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent. Deputy Clay Jenkins LCSO, responded to the intersection of Hwy 321 and Hwy 70, to assist Deputy Holcomb on a disabled vehicle. Upon arrival Deputy made contact Deputy Holcomb, who advised he observed Sylvia Hanley sitting in the emergency lane in a white vehicle. Upon making contact with Hanley Deputy observed her to be lethargic, slurred speech and was having trouble responding to his questions.
