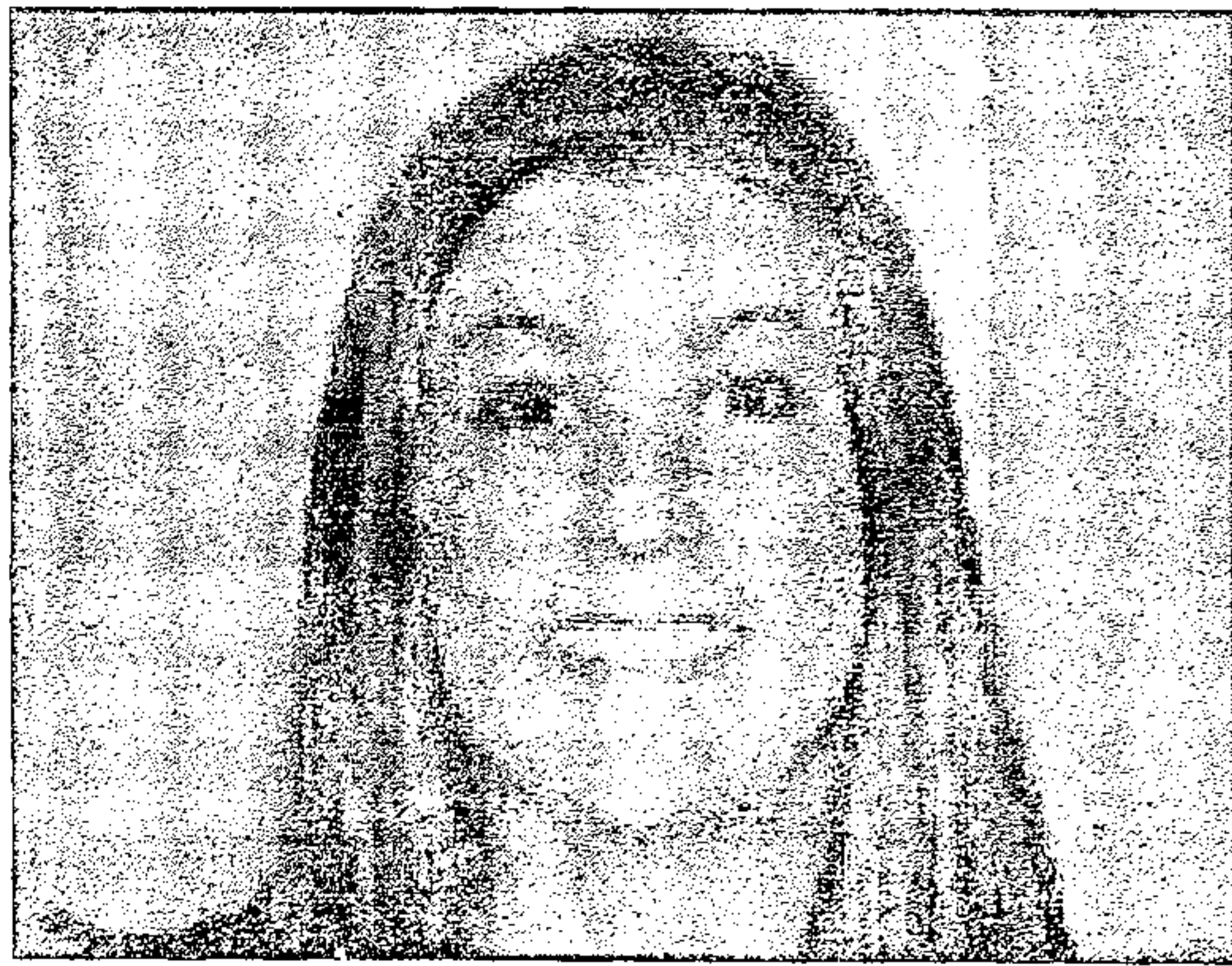

Today, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is releasing new science-based resources and tools for school administrators, teachers, parents, guardians, and caregivers when schools open this fall.

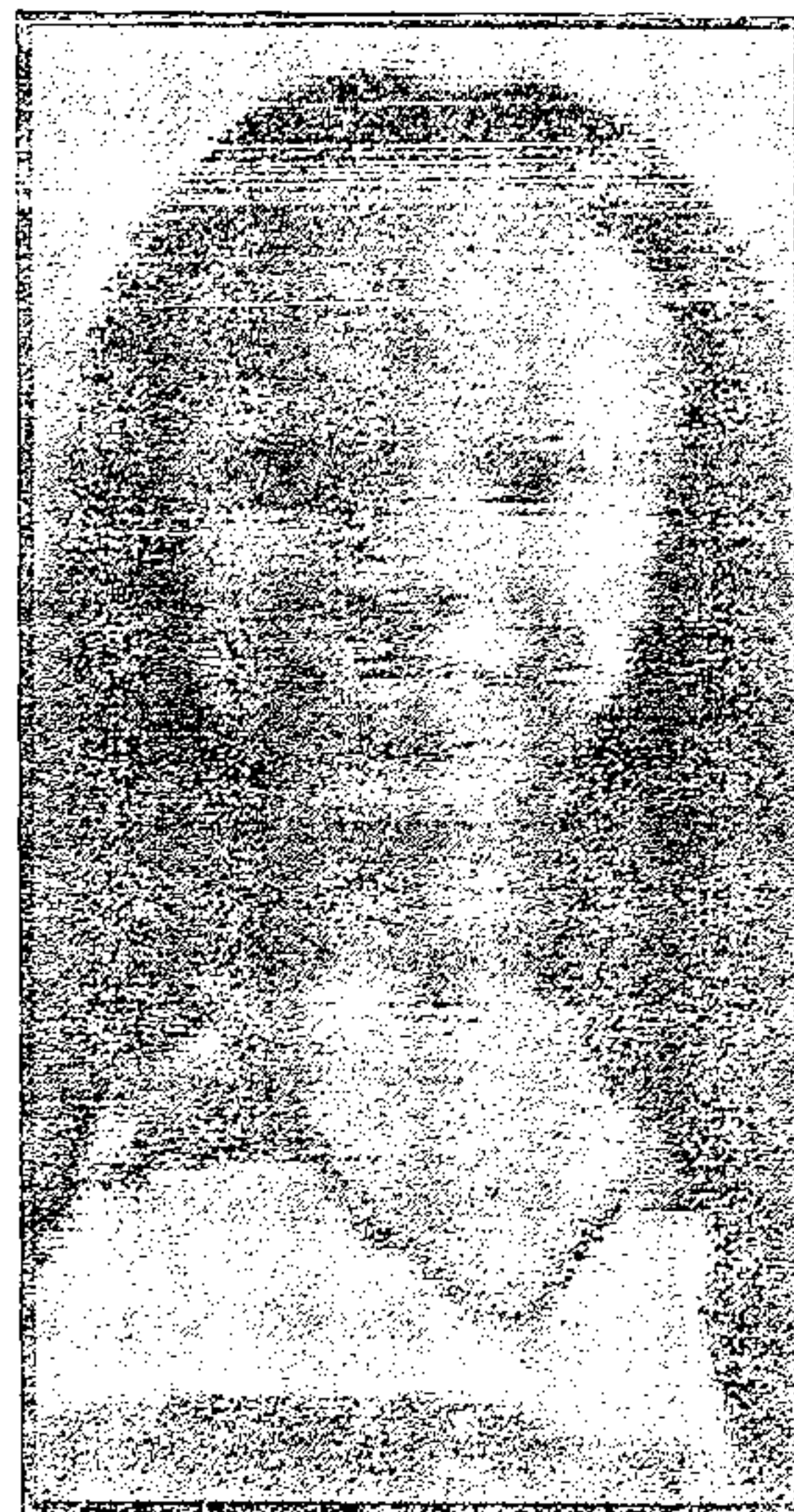
With states, cities, and communities around the United States experiencing different levels

of coronavirus transmission, jurisdictions should ensure appropriate public health strategies are in place to slow the spread of COVID-19 as the first step in creating a safer school environment. Then, working in collaboration with their state and local health departments, school administrators can employ strategies

that best match the local conditions and actions that are practical and feasible in their schools to help protect the health and safety of everyone – including students, teachers, and other staff.

"It is critically important for our public health to open schools this fall," said CDC Director Dr. Robert

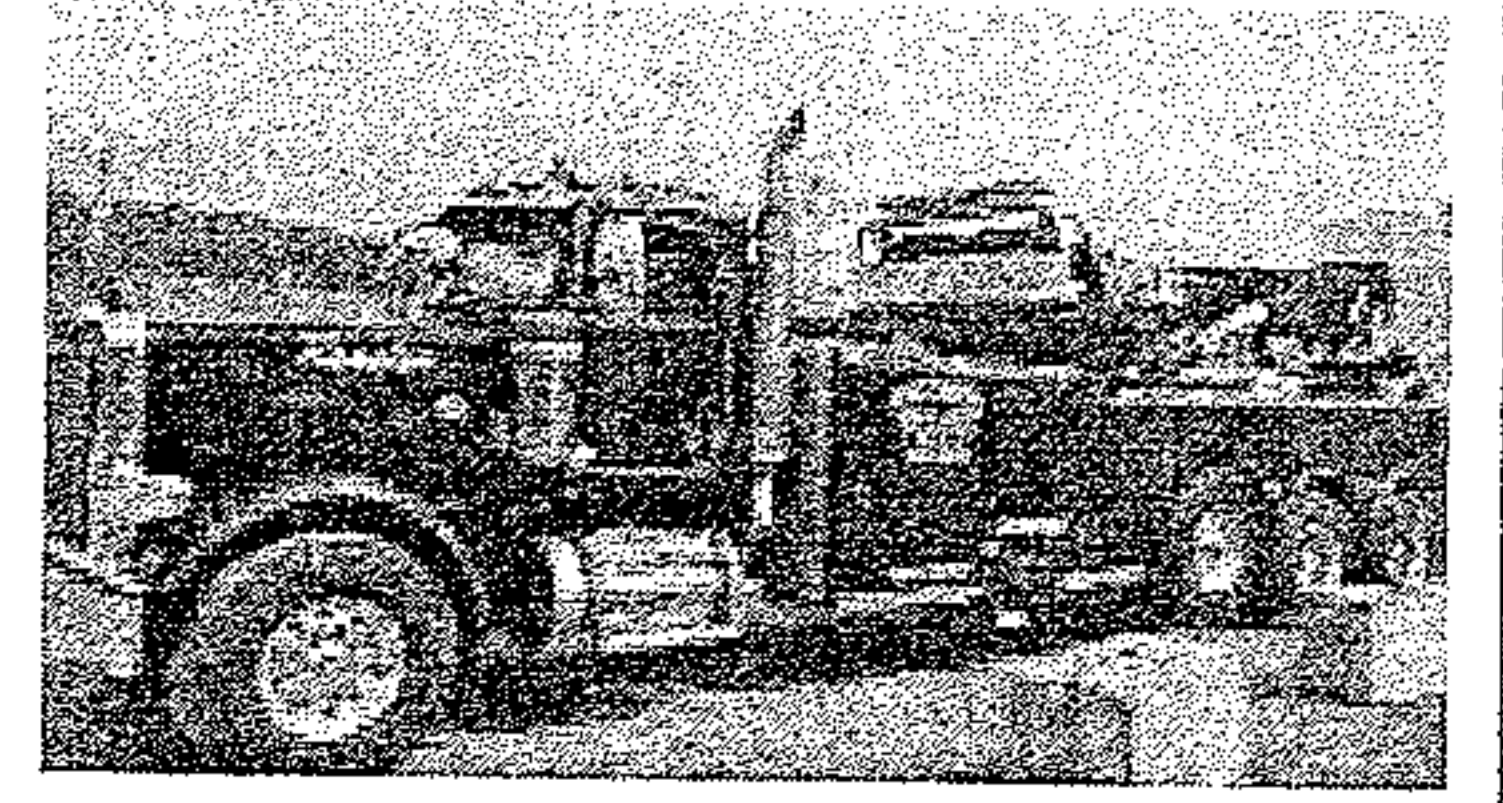

Drive off of Harrison Road sometime before August of 2019. In response Hurley hired attorney T. Scott Jones who filed a motion to have the lawsuit dismissed and a second motion to have District Attorney Johnson kicked off the case. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic the Tennessee Supreme Court issued orders that caused the temporary closing of courts and/or the restriction of hearings that were not related to defendants being held in custody on criminal cases. Therefore, a hearing on the motions was not held until Thursday, July 23rd. The motions were heard before Chancellor Frank Williams in Kingston on Thursday. A number of Loudon County Commissioners were in attendance. The hearing took about an hour of argument from both sides and review of case law and statutes presented to the Chancellor on the unique nature of quo warranto actions and the role of the district attorney in bringing such actions. Chancellor Williams ultimately ruled against Hurley and her counsel finding that it was an appropriate action for the district attorney to bring and the he could continue to prosecute the matter against Hurley.


The next step in this case is for Hurley to file a formal

Answer to the lawsuit and for the parties to begin 'discovery' in preparation for trial. Chancery Court terms for Loudon County are August and December. The docket is already set for August so the earliest that matter can be tried will be in December.

license with a fraudulent number, cloned visa debit card, \$6460.00 in money orders and \$3000.00 cash. Agents were able to make contact with 3 females identified as Dianne Coffie, Ayeesha Shah, and Darrelranisha Thomas, in the Black Range Rover. Cpl. Chris Jenkins and K9 partner Deja conducted an open air sniff of the vehicle. Cpl. Jenkins advised Deja did give a positive alert to the odor of narcotics inside the vehicle. During the search of the vehicle agents found 314 credit/debit cards, \$29,420.00 in cash, numerous money orders totaling \$10,902 and 2 packets of marijuana totaling approximately 7 grams. Several of the credit/debit cards had been recorded so the numbers do not match the "Bank Identification Number" of the card issuer. Walmart Asset Protection was able to provide documentation showing all 4 individuals made transactions inside the store. This did happen in Loudon County, TN.

## The 30th Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act

On July 26, our nation will celebrate the 30th anniversary of the landmark Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), which provides protections against discrimination of people with disabilities in several areas including employment, education, health care, recreation, transportation, and housing.

The ADA was enacted and signed into law to ensure that people with disabilities have the same rights and access to opportunities as people without disabilities. CDC recognizes the ADA as an opportunity for the inclusion of people with disabilities in federal efforts related to public health and health care.

“CDC is committed to protecting the health and well-being of people with disabilities in our public health efforts,” said CDC Director Robert R. Redfield, M.D. “Addressing the current pandemic, CDC has heightened our efforts during the COVID-19 response to ensure that people with dis-

abilities are represented in our guidance and have access to important public health information. We continue to work closely with our partners to deliver essential information to individuals with disabilities and their families and are creating a variety of web resources in accessible formats, including American Sign Language.”

Over the last 30 years, there have been real gains in access to public health programs, such as interventions and accessible formats that are tailored to meet the needs of people with different types of disabilities, as well as improvements in the built environ-

ment, such as accessible walkways, playgrounds, and parks. However, inequalities still exist. People with disabilities continue to face significant health disparities compared to people who do not have disabilities. Adults with disabilities are three times more likely to have heart disease, stroke, diabetes, or cancer than adults without disabilities.

“The struggles for access to health care and inclusion that people with disabilities face must be addressed—public health is for everyone,” added Dr. Redfield. “We encourage all Amer-

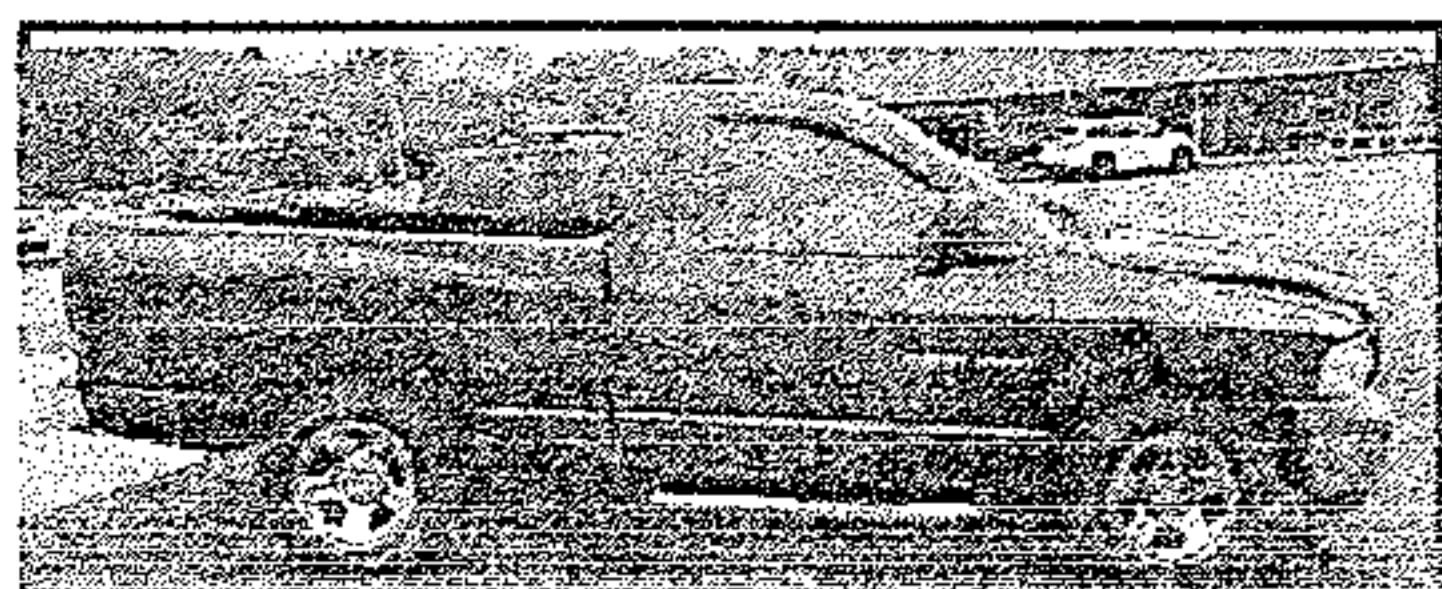
