Katherine Finn, 40, SE Hall Drive Georgia, was charged with Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. I, and Poss. Of Drug Para.

Franklin Major, 38, Groovers Lane Loudon, was charged with Criminal Impersonation, Poss. Of Drug Para., and Man/Sell/Del. Resale of Meth.

Officer S. Runyan LCPD, was dispatched to Hwy 321 North to a call from a female stating she had been kidnapped and is at the store with a male and female in a vehicl3 with butterfly doors. The female also stated that the male and female had dope hidden in the vehicle. Upon arrival Officer made contact with the male who had no identification on his person standing near the vehicle in question.

When Officer ask for the male information he gave the name of Richard and a wrong date of birth. Agent C. Fritts DTF, came to the scene and identified male as Frank Major. Officer contacted Symrna Police Dept. who positively identified Frank Major who did have active warrant out of Georgia. Major did not have a valid license. The female in the vehicle was identified as Katherine Finn. During the investigation the vehicle was inventoried for towing. Officer located approx.. 11.23 grams of meth in the truck, and a glass pipe used for smoking meth. Both were placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

### Wreck

Robert Torres, 21, Tomotley Road Maryville, was charged with DUI, Violation of Implied Consent, and Leaving the Scene of Accident.

According to the report, Deputy L. Anderson LCSO, observed a Blount County Sheriff's Office Patrol vehicle at the county line on Hwy 321 South with their emergency lights activated. Upon checking on BCSO Deputy observed a male laying in the emergency lane of the highway unresponsive. The male was identified as Robert Torres, the offender. Robert had a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from his person and had blood shoot watery eyes. Robert stated to BCSO he did not remember how he got there.

Deputy sent Deputy Curtis LCSO to check the area of Meadow Rd W. for a possible crash.







#### Fraud

An Arkansas woman is ordered to repay the state of Tennessee more than \$29,000 in sentencing on TennCare fraud charges.

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) today announced sentencing for Karen Wilson-Hicks, 53, in Shelby County, where she was accused of enrolling in TennCare by falsely reporting a Tennessee residence.

Wilson-Hicks must repay the state a total of \$29,202.61 for benefits she and her two children received while she was improperly enrolled in TennCare. Wilson-Hicks was arrested in September of last year, when she was charged with TennCare fraud and theft of property over \$10,000.

"We appreciate the perseverance of the Shelby County District Attorney General's

Office in bringing prosecution of TennCare fraud to the forefront in their local communities," Inspector General Kim Harmon said. "Our office will continue to do our part and preserve the integrity of TennCare benefits, so that those truly deserving of and eligible for TennCare have the best resources."

Since 2005, the OIG has conducted more than 128,472 investigations of TennCare fraud and abuse. In the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 OIG opened 2,325 investigations and recommended 234 terminations from TennCare with potential savings of \$950,353.20. Beyond restitution, the OIG's work provides program integrity for the TennCare program, protecting the resources of the citizens of Tennessee by identifying, investigating and deterring TennCare fraud.


#### Obituaries






