





May 10, 2017. Three people were charged in the death of Johnson. LaQueena Brown was set for trial on September 22nd. The other two co-defendants, Christopher and Clarence Porter have their trials set on May 11, 2021 and June 1, 2021. Brown admitted in her plea that she called Porter and Orr to assist her in getting property and money from Johnson that she claimed Johnson owed her. Brown was not the shooter in the murder, but she waited outside.

Brown was sentenced by Judge Wicks to a 22 year sentence to serve in TDOC custody in exchange for the felony-murder, aggravated burglary and robbery charges against her being dismissed.

Janey Johnson and Ashley Martin, the sister and daughter of Jim Johnson testified at

the end of the plea about the impact that Johnson's murder has had on them, his children and grandchildren. Janey Johnson blamed Brown for basically 'orchestrating' the events that led to the murder. Martin gave a moving statement about her father that even brought tears to the defendant who sat listening to the statements.

Brown has been in custody for approximately three years since her arrest. She will receive credit for her time served against her prison sentence. Assistant District Attorneys Robert Edwards and Jed Bassett handled the case. Walter Johnson represented the defendant.

son County Grand Jury on one count of the theft over \$2,500, and one count of fraudulent use of a credit or debit card over \$2,500.

"School support organizations are required to establish financial controls that safeguard money," said Comptroller Justin P. Wilson. "In this situation, no other officer or member of the PTA reviewed bank statements until the bank sent a notification that the account was overdrawn. School support organizations need effective oversight in order to prevent and detect fraud."

Memphis-Arca Nonprofits Wrongfully Obtained More Than \$37,000

Food Program Sponsors Falsified Documents to Receive Federal Funds

The Tennessee Comptroller's Office has released two investigations revealing fraudulent actions by two Memphis-area nonprofit organizations.

Red Robins Academy of Learning, Inc. (RRAL), and Giving Youth a Chance (GYAC) both participated in the Summer Food Service Program in 2018. This federal program is administered by the Tennessee Department of Human Services (DHS) and provides free meals to children during summer months when school is not in session.

RRAL and GYAC both sponsored multiple feeding sites in the Memphis area. The organizations are reimbursed for meals served based on meal count sheets submitted to DHS. Comptroller investigators and auditors, working in cooperation with the Memphis Police

Department, used video surveillance to determine if the organizations were actually serving the number of meals and snacks they claimed in July 2018.

Investigators and auditors determined that Red Robins Academy of Learning, Inc. wrongfully obtained at least \$19,539.74 in federal funds.

Investigators and auditors obtained the daily meal count forms submitted by RRAL and compared the numbers listed with video surveillance footage from three different feeding sites. At two of those sites, RRAL claimed thousands of meals and snacks were served when, in fact, RRAL did not feed a single child.

The investigation also found that Giving Youth a Chance wrongfully obtained at least \$17,601.72 in federal funds.

Comptroller investigators and auditors once again discovered a pattern of falsified meal count sheets. Based on video surveillance evidence from four feeding sites, investigators determined GYAC requested reimbursement for thousands of meals and snacks that were never served to children.

The Comptroller's Office has shared the results of these investigations with the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Western District of Tennessee and the Office of the District Attorney General of the 30th Judicial District.

"Our Office has repeatedly reported on weaknesses within the Summer Food Service Program," said Comptroller Justin P. Wilson. "It is imperative that the Tennessee Department of Human Services continue to ensure that all participants maintain complete and accurate documentation for meal reimbursement claims."
