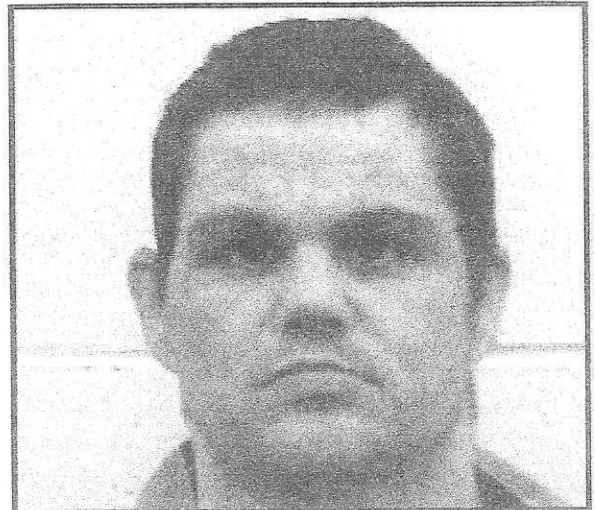

Hamilton County Schools Awarded \$266,314 for STOP School Violence Program

The Department of Justice today announced nearly \$126 million in funding to advance school safety under the STOP School Violence Act. The grants, awarded by the Office of Justice Programs' Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) and the depart-

ment's Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS Office), will help institute safety measures in and around primary and secondary schools, support school violence prevention efforts, provide training to school personnel and students, and implement evidence-based threat assessments.

"The Justice Department has no greater

responsibility than protecting Americans from harm," said Attorney General Merrick B. Garland. "Schools must be safe places to learn, and today's investment of more than \$125 million under the STOP School Violence Act will help ensure that they are."

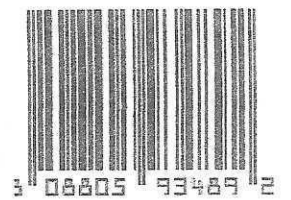

Angela Turney, 33, High Street North Carolina, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, and Contraband in a Penal Institution.

Officers with the Lenoir City Police Department arrested Angela Brittney Turney and transported her to the Loudon County Detention Facility. Prior to entering the facility, Turney was asked if she had anything on her person that would be considered contraband, to which she answered negatively. A baggy containing 0.82 grams of a crystalline substance

which later tested positive as methamphetamine was located in Turney's private area during a non-invasive strip search conducted by Deputy Carla Sutton. Turney was in possession of the methamphetamine inside the Loudon County Detention Facility where prisoners are quartered and without the express written consent of the jail administrator.

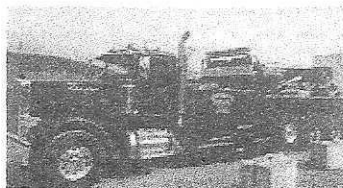

Kevin Greene, 21, Hackney Chapel Road Lenoir City, was charged with Aggravated Assault.

Corporal Z. Frye LCSO, responded to Hackney Chapel Road for a domestic assault. On scene Deputy made contact with Kevin Greene, the offender. Greene stated him and his girlfriend/victim had gotten into a verbal argument earlier that night. He then stated that he and his girlfriend began having sexual intercourse and he starting choking her because she stated she liked that.

They had agreed to use a safe word of "pineapple" if he was getting too rough. He further stated that he began choking her so tight that he believed she wasn't able to say the safe word because he was choking her too tight. He also stated he assumed that was why she was upset tonight. Deputy then spoke

with victim, and she stated that her and Kevin had been arguing all day because he told her he no longer wanted her living in his house. He then pulled her outside and shoved her down in the mud and told her to leave. She then attempted to come back inside and he was able to grab her by the neck and choke her trying to force her to the ground. She then stated he began holding her down on the bed and starting choking her again to the point where she began losing consciousness and could not breathe. She was then able to get away and go to the other bedroom and call 9-1-1. I did observe red marks all around her neck, scratches along the neck and mud on her clothing. Based upon all the evidence present I determined Greene to be the primary aggressor and placed him under arrest for Domestic Assault Felony. This all occurred in Loudon County, TN.

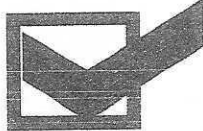

\$266,314 from the 2021 COPS School Violence Prevention Program funding for Hamilton County, Tennessee,” said Acting United States Attorney Francis M. Hamilton III. “Hamilton County Schools will utilize this award to proactively address school violence by providing educators and students the resources and support they need to learn, grow, and thrive.”

The Students, Teachers and Officers Preventing School Violence Act of 2018 (the “STOP School Violence Act”) gives the Justice Department the authority to provide awards directly to states, units of local government, Indian tribes, and public agencies (such as school districts and law enforcement agencies) to improve security at schools and on school grounds through evidence-based school safety programs. It also provides grants to ensure a positive

school climate by helping students and teachers recognize, respond quickly to, and help prevent acts of violence.

The 78 BJA annual awards, totaling almost \$74 million, are intended to support training and education for school personnel and students on preventing violence against others and themselves, including anti-bullying training and specialized training for school officials to respond to mental health crises. Funds also help develop and implement multidisciplinary threat assessment or intervention teams and design technology solutions such as anonymous reporting systems, hotlines and websites.

The COPS School Violence Prevention Program (SVPP) provides up to 75% of the funding for school safety measures in and around primary and secondary schools. The 153 SVPP awards, totaling almost \$52 million, are statutorily obligated to be used for coor-

dination with law enforcement; training for local law enforcement officers to prevent student violence; locks, lighting and other deterrent measures; technology for expedited notification of local law enforcement during an emergency; and other measures that provide a significant improvement in security.
