George Thacker, 59, of Spring City, Tennessee, was sentenced to 33 months in prison by the Honorable Charles E. Atchley, Jr. in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Tennessee at Chattanooga.

As part of a plea agreement filed with the court, Thacker agreed to plead guilty to a one-count Bill of Information charging him with wire fraud in

relation to COVID-19 relief funds, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 1343. Thacker was ordered to pay \$665,600.00 in restitution and a \$15,000.00 fine, and he will be on supervised release for 3 years following his release from prison.

In 2020, the United States Government enacted The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act") in an

effort to stave off negative economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Two related programs – the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP") and the Economic Injury Disaster Loan ("EIDL") program – provided forgivable or low-interest loans to businesses affected by the pandemic.

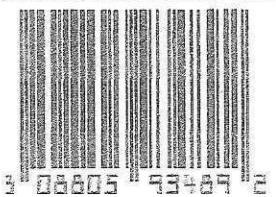
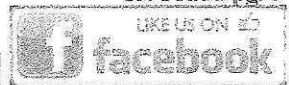

William Brewster, 48, Shenedoah Drive Friendsville, was charged with General Session Capias, Simple Possession, Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. I, Contraband in Penal Institution, and Poss. Of Drug Para.

Shannon Lett, 41, Zelmer Lane Maryville, was charged with Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. II & IV & I, Contraband in Penal Institution, Driving on Suspended License, and Poss. Of Drug Para.

Deputy Green LCSO, observed a white F-150 traveling South on Highway 321 near JB's Country Store. Deputy observed the front passenger to be William Brewster. Having prior knowledge Mr. Brewster had active warrants Deputy conducted a traffic stop at JB's. Deputy made contact with Mr. Brewster and asked him to exit the vehicle and took him into custody without incident. Before placing Brewster in the back of his patrol car Deputy conducted a search of his person and recovered a syringe in which he stated he used to inject Heroin. Deputy located one Suboxone Strip in Brewster's wallet. Deputy requested the driver, Shannon Lett, to exit the vehicle and asked if there was anything illegal inside of the vehicle in which she stated there were several syringes inside the truck. Deputy conducted a Probable Cause search of the vehicle as well as received consent to search from the registered owner. Upon search of the vehicle, Deputy located numerous syringes, digital scales, empty baggies with a white powdery residue, torch lighters, spoons with heavy black burn marks and drug residue, and a glass pipe. Deputy located a black case in the driver's side door which contained several clear baggies with a powder residue and a

small blue baggie containing approximately 2.5 grams of an off-white gravel-like substance believed to be Heroin (TruNarc Scan# 1725). Deputy requested a driver's license status check through dispatch which advised Lett's driver's license was suspended for child support. Deputy Gann took Ms. Lett into custody. Deputy asked both subjects what the substance was and Ms. Lett stated she believed it was baking soda but did not belong to her and Mr. Brewster stated he wanted his attorney. Both subjects were transported to Loudon County Jail without incident. Upon arrival at the jail, Deputy asked both subjects if they possessed anything illegal before entering jail and they both claimed they did not. Deputy advised them if they did, it would be a felony. Upon entering the jail Mr. Brewster was searched by Officer Brannon where Officer Brannon recovered a small blue baggie containing approximately .4 grams of an off-white substance believed to be Heroin located in his left front pocket under several screws (TruNarc Scan#1733). Officer Peters conducted a search of Ms. Lett where she recovered a large quantity of suspected narcotics located inside of Ms. Lett's Vagina. Upon removal of the narcotics, there were 3 separate bags, one containing 3.3 grams of an off-white gravel-like substance (TruNarc Scan# 1729), another bag containing .9 grams of an off-white gravel-like substance (TruNarc Scan#1730), and the last bag contained numerous pills (12 Oxycodone 10mg, 14 Clonazepam 1mg, 20 Clonazepam .5mg, and 25.5 Alprazolam 2mg). Deputy responded to the jail to retrieve these items and all items, excluding the prescription medication, were tested using the TruNarc

which returned showing a positive result for Heroin/Fentanyl compound. All prescription medications were identified using Pill Identifier. Ms. Lett was charged with Manufacture, Sell, Delivery of Schedule 1, 2, and 4, Contraband in Penal Institution, Unlawful Drug Paraphernalia, and Driving on suspended. Mr.

Brewster was charged with Manufacture, Sell, Delivery of Schedule 1, Simple Possession of Schedule 1 and 4, Contraband in Penal Institution, and the Capias for Driving under the influence was served. Both subject's phones were stored in Locker 1 pending further investigation regarding the distribution of Narcotics.

Ricky Mills, 37, Scott Street Philadelphia, was charged with Aggravated Assault.

Deputy S. Gaumer LCSO, was dispatched to an active domestic in progress at Scott Street, Philadelphia, TN.

When Deputy arrived on scene, he found a female standing outside of the residence. She identified herself as the complainant and victim, who said that "he was in the house and I want him out". Initially, Deputy did not observe victim to be injured, so Deputy proceeded to the residence. Deputy entered the house to find a male starting to lay down on the couch in the living room. The male identified himself as Ricky Mills, the offender. While speaking to him, Dep-

uty could see that his eyes were glassy and bloodshot and his speech was slurred. Deputy asked him to tell him what had happened this evening and he had trouble forming complete sentences.

Mr. Mills said that he and the victim had an argument over KFC (Kentucky Fried Chicken) and she called 911 because of that. Deputy asked if the argument turned physical, and he said no.

Upon looking around the house, Deputy found nothing to be in any obvious disarray. At this point, Mr. Mills had trouble continuing to answer questions, so Deputy stepped outside and spoke with victim. While speaking with her, Deputy learned the following:

Shortly before calling 911, Mr. Mills, and the victim were in the living room and they

began to argue. Victim went in to the kitchen, and that is when she said Mr. Mills came in to the kitchen and grabbed her by the throat, pushing her on the counter.

She said she would call 911 if he didn't stop. According to victim, he said "B*&^%, call them then". After showing her phone to him, and him seeing that 911 had been called, that was when Mr. Mills let go of her throat and exited the kitchen. She then exited the house and waited for law enforcement to ar-

rive.

It should be noted that Deputy observed no marks on, or near, victim neck. She did, however, have two black eyes that appeared to be in the later stages of bruising.

Due to the nature of the alleged incident, Deputy placed Mr. Mills under arrest for Aggravated Assault. He was transported to the Loudon County Jail without incident. All occurred in Loudon County, TN.

Officer Trey Clemmer LPD, was driving East on Hwy 72 headed towards Hwy 11 and noticed a black sedan parked in the middle of the intersection with the hazard lights on. 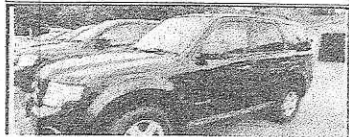

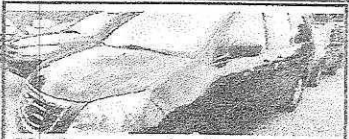

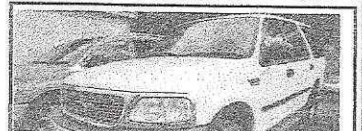

Fraud

According to court documents, between May 2020 and February 2021, Thacker submitted three separate fraudulent applications for a total of over \$650,000 in PPP and EIDL relief funds. At the time, he served as the elected County Executive for Rhea County, Tennessee, and the owner of Thacker Corporation, a business headquartered in the Eastern District of Tennessee. As part of the loan application process, he certified that he would use the money for specific business-related purposes such as paying Thacker Corporation's rent and continuing to pay his employees' salaries. But instead of putting the relief funds to their intended purposes, Thacker used them to enrich himself. Among other things, he used the money to buy Bitcoin, Ether, and other cryptocurrencies and to fund his personal investment accounts.

"COVID-19 relief fraud is a serious crime," said United States Attorney Francis M. Hamilton III. "Mr. Thacker's scheme to defraud exploited a relief program designed to ease the economic suffering of all American workers and businesses. Today, he is being held accountable for his actions, and the Court's sentence should demonstrate to any who are tempted to follow in his footsteps that this crime carries with it serious consequences. I commend the hard work of the United States Secret Service and all involved with this prosecution. The U.S. Attorney's Office is committed to uncovering and prosecuting those who unlawfully exploited the COVID-19 pan-

demical for personal gain, and we will continue to work together with our federal law enforcement partners to ensure that any who abuse federal relief programs are brought to justice."

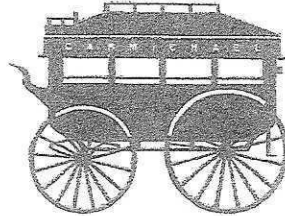
"One of the Secret Service's primary roles is to protect the U.S. financial infrastructure, including pandemic related fraud. At the onset of the pandemic, fraud related to personal protective equipment was of primary concern to all law enforcement. Additionally, the release of Federal funding through the CARES Act and subsequent funding heightened this priority. The Secret Service is committed to combatting financial crime, especially in cases where fraudsters take advantage of American citizens during these trying times. The Secret Service, through its partnership with Federal and State, local law enforcement, and the private sector financial institutions, will continue to make this a primary concern for the Department," said Resident Agent in Charge Juan Alicea of the United States Secret Service ("USSS") Chattanooga Resident Office.

The prosecution resulted from an investigation by the USSS.

Assistant United States Attorney Kyle Wilson prosecuted this case on behalf of the United States.
