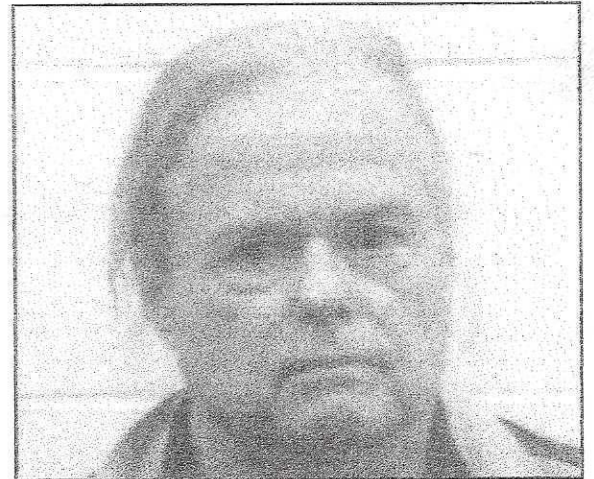

U.S. Attorney's Office For The Eastern District Of Tennessee Announces \$166,027 In Justice Department Grants To Support Project Safe Neighborhoods

The U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Tennessee announced today that the Department of Justice has awarded \$166,027 to support the Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN) Program in the Eastern District of Tennessee. Funding will support community efforts to address the epidemic of gun crime and serious violence in the district. The PSN grant

was to the Tennessee Department of Finance and Administration and is one of a number of awards being made to state and local agencies across the country. Funds are administered by the Bureau of Justice Assistance, part of the Department's Office of Justice Programs.

Launched two decades ago as an evidence-based and community-oriented

response to serious gun crime, Project Safe Neighborhoods, known as PSN, is a key component of the Department's Comprehensive Strategy for Reducing Violent Crime, outlined by Deputy Attorney General Monaco in May 2021. The PSN approach is guided

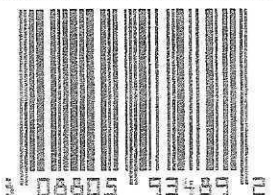
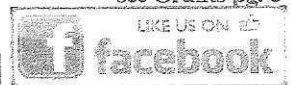

Hit and Run

Mary Thaxton, 62, Halls Ferry Road Lenoir City, was charged with DUI, Open Container, Leaving the Scene of Accident, Financial Responsibility.

Officer McGinnis LCPD, was dispatched to the area of D St and 2nd Ave in reference to a wreck with no injury. Upon arrival, Officer met with (driver vehicle #2/ complainant), who informed him that at the stop sign on D St and 2nd Ave a vehicle had attempted to pass her on the right side and on to the walk way, striking the passenger side of her vehicle from the rear quarter panel up to the front passenger side fender. Also stating, the driver of the other vehicle had drove off after the wreck.

The victim was able to describe the vehicle as a dark blue Ford Focus with a TN registration 081BBFN, which registers back to Ms. Mary Nancy Thaxton. Victim was also able to provide a video she took using her phone of the driver while the driver was in the process of leaving the scene, which places Ms. Thaxton in the vehicle described above at the time of the wreck. A short

time later, Officer was dispatched to McGhee Square Apartments in reference to a domestic disturbance, where Officer found the suspect to be Ms. Mary Nancy Thaxton. Ms. Thaxton was sitting in the same vehicle described by victim and shown on the video.

While talking to Ms. Thaxton, Officer noticed that she appeared to have blood shot eyes and slurred speech. Upon further investigation it was found that Ms. Thaxton had 1 half empty beer can in her front seat cupholder along with 1 full can of beer in the passenger seat. Officer then proceeded to perform SFST to which she did perform poorly. I then placed Ms. Thaxton under arrest and read her the Tennessee Blood and or Breath Consent Advisement, to which she consented to a blood draw for chemical testing. Officer then transported Ms. Thaxton to Fort Loudoun Medical Center for her blood draw, and following that he transported her to the Loudon County Jail without incident. During investigation, Ms. Thaxton stated that she did not have financial responsibility on the above vehicle.

Robert Bartsch, 66, Tommotley Drive Loudon, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, Tampering/Fabricating with Evidence, and Resisting Arrest.

Deputy C. Wallen LCSO, and Deputy A. Gann, responded to Tommotley Dr., Loudon, for a welfare check on a female in reference to a possible domestic. Upon arrival, a white male subject with grey hair in a low pony tail and wearing all black, later identified as Robert Bartsch (offender), was observed through the front window of the residence running out the rear of the residence. A neighbor at Santee Way, Loudon, behind the residence at Tommotley Dr., called dispatch to advise the neighbor (Bartsch) was banging on the front door of the residence demanding to come in. Deputy Gann

and Wallen investigated this complaint and discovered Bartsch in the wood line near the residence. Bartsch then fled on foot. Marissa Mantooth, 29, Patton Court Kentucky, was charged with Man/Sell/Poss. Of Controlled Substance.

Officer R. Miller LCPD, was conducting a patrol in the area of Highway 321 North in Lenoir City, TN. During his patrol duties Officer observed a gray in color Mazda sedan traveling south on Highway 321. While observing the vehicle Officer noticed that it was missing the front bumper causing the metal frame of the vehicle to be exposed. Officer then observed that the Kentucky Registration displayed on the rear of the vehicle (9-45XYM) showed to be expired back from June of 2022. Officer then initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle in the parking lot of Bimbos Gas Station in Lenoir City, TN. Upon traffic stop Officer made contact with the driver, and passenger, Marissa Mantooth, both of Louisville, KY. While speaking with both subjects Officer could smell an odor of marijuana com-

ing from inside of the vehicle where at which time Officer had the driver step out of the vehicle to speak with him about a citation. While speaking with the driver about a citation, Officer asked about the odor of marijuana coming from inside of the vehicle. Driver stated that they had a little bit of marijuana at which time he handed Officer a bag that MONTTOOTH had at her feet inside of the vehicle. Recovered from inside of the bag were (3) marijuana blunts located in a swisher sweets package. A probable cause search was then conducted of the entire vehicle where Office-4r located an additional bag of green leafy substance believed to be marijuana in a suitcase with what appeared to be girl clothing and prescription medication(s) belonging to MONTTOOTH. The total amount of marijuana including the (3) marijuana blunts came out to be (35.46 Grams). MONTTOOTH was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

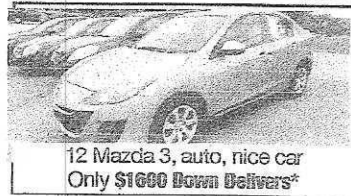

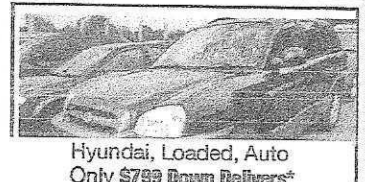

The fundamental goal is to reduce violent crime, not simply to increase the number of arrests or prosecutions.

Governor Vote for One (1)	<p>Summary: This amendment would add to article III, section 12 of the Tennessee Constitution a process for the temporary exercise of the powers and duties of the governor by the Speaker of the Senate or the Speaker of the House if there is no Speaker of the Senate in office when the governor is unable to discharge the powers and duties of the office of governor. While a Speaker is temporarily discharging the powers and duties of the governor, the Speaker would not be required to resign as Speaker or to resign as a member of the legislature; but the Speaker would not be able to preside as Speaker or vote as a member of the legislature. A Speaker who is temporarily discharging the powers and duties of the governor would not get the governor's salary but would get the Speaker's salary.
