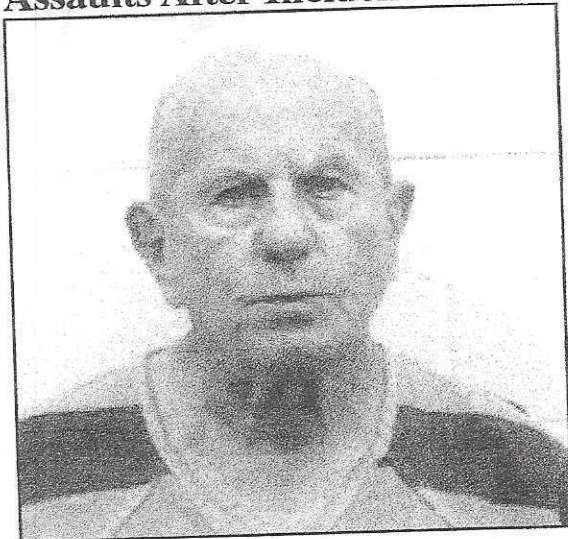

Brewster Pleads Guilty to Harassment; No Jail Time

Tim Brewster entered a guilty plea in Loudon County Criminal Court today to a harassment charge involving Pat Hunter as a victim. He was given a sentence on the class A misdemeanor of 11 months 29 days with a no contact order involving Pat Hunter for the duration of the sentence. He will have to pay the court costs as well. The stalking charge was dismissed as a condition of the guilty plea to the harassment charge. Robert Hinton, Brewster's attorney, announced to the court that due to his deteriorating health, Tim Brewster would remain in the car in the parking lot. One of the court see Brewster pg.4

Initiative surged resources to support women and children in Indigenous communities

Who gets the car? This was the problem Special Agents Derek Kay and his colleague were trying to solve from a carjacking case years earlier in Yakama, Washington. The original case agent were trying to wrap up loose ends.

They drove to the home of the last person involved in the case to see if they

wanted the car back. But that person didn't speak English. So, they phoned a colleague to help translate.

For Special Agent Kay, this all felt right at home. Before joining the Bureau, he was a police officer in Chicago for 15 years, and this was the kind of day he'd have. He could go from an armed robbery scene to setting up undercover work within one shift. He also did

plenty of interviews. After a few minutes, the agents got their answer—the individual didn't want the car. The pair headed back to the office.

So began Special Agent Kay's 39th day working on a Native American reservation as part of Operation Not Forgotten, an FBI initiative that detailed 40 special agents, in-

Drugs

Brieanda Melton, 43, Rushbrook Lane Lenoir City, was charged with Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. II & III., Simple Possession, and Violation of Probation.

Law enforcement was dispatched to Fort Loudon Medical Center in reference to a female Brieanda Melton, who brought narcotics into the hospital to a patient. Law enforcement spoke to ER staff who stated that they witnessed Melton hand narcotics to a patient. ER staff took possession of the narcotics and turned over a folded piece of paper with a small amount of brown powder to police. Upon speaking to Melton Agent asked her if

she had anything illegal on her and she retrieved a ball of toilet paper from her bra that contained (4) Gabapentin 800 mg, (2) Omeprazole, (4) Mycophenolate Mofetil, (2) Buspirone Hydrochloride, (2) Sertraline Hydrochloride, (1) Amlodipine Besylate, and (1) Metoprolol Tartrate. The agent read Melton her Miranda warnings and she agreed to speak to him. Melton stated that her friend in the hospital asked her to bring her something because she was sick. Melton stated that she stopped at a drug dealer's house and picked up what she believed to be Cocaine. Melton then drove to Fort Loudon Hospital where she delivered the drugs to her friend. Melton was taken into

custody and transported to the Loudon County Jail. A 908 test on the brown pow-

der determined the drug to be Fentanyl, Xylazine, and ANPP.

Charles Best, 82, Stone Harbor Lenoir City, was charged with Domestic Assault x2 and Assault.

Deputy Bengel LCSO, responded to Stone Harbor Blvd in reference to a Domestic Assault. Deputies Dishner, Harrison, and Yap arrived on scene prior to Bengel arrival.

According to the report, Upon my arrival, Deputy made contact with the Victim/Complainant, who lives in the home, stated that Charles Best (the Offender who also lives in the home) had followed him into the dining room when he tried to move a chair to the living room. Victim stated that Best refused to stop and then pushed victim back with his elbow. Victim was close to the back door of the home

and stepped outside. When the victim attempted to step back in, Best grabbed victims arm in an attempt to prevent him from reentering the home.

The report further noted, At one point the victim was able to reenter the home and witnessed Best forcibly pick up victims mom (victim 2 Best's wife) from the couch and tried moving her to the floor. Victim 2 is a hospice patient who suffers from terminal cancer and is bed-ridden. Best simultaneously told victim2 to get off the couch that he had paid for. Deputy also spoke to victim 2 who collaborated victim 1 side of the story. During the second altercation, victim 2 13-year-old grandson (victim 3), who was also in the living room, stood up and told Best not to touch victim 2.

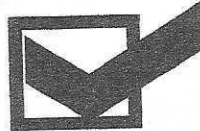
Best forcibly grabbed victim 3 by the shirt and told him to shut up. Best put all 3 victims in fear during the multiple altercations that occurred.

When Deputies Dishner and Harrison arrived, they entered the home and found Best standing at the couch where victim 2 was lying.

Victim 2 was on the phone with her doctor and Best was actively attempting to remove the phone from victims 2 grasp. Due to the totality of the circumstances, Best was taken into custody and transported to the Loudon County Jail. Said events occurred in Loudon County, TN.

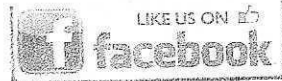

telligence analysts, staff operational specialists, and victim specialists to 10 FBI field offices whose designated regions support women and children in Indigenous communities. During the resource surge, investigators handled over 220 cases.

Yakama was not what Kay expected; more specifically, the climate was not what he expected. His home office is in Corpus Christi, Texas, where he works on the Safe Streets Task Force focusing primarily on gang and drug activity. The Yakama Indian Reservation, meanwhile, is 100 miles southeast of Seattle.

The drive takes just over two hours. Along the way, the lush forestry of northwest Washington, with its gloomy, overcast skies, seamlessly transitions into rolling tan mountains with

brown rocks and tough desert fauna. It is hot, sunny, and dry in Yakama—resembling Corpus Christi more than the neighboring Seattle.

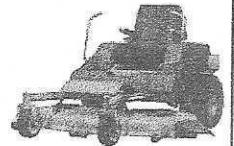
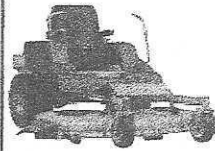

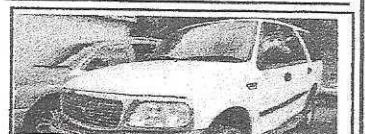

enous communities. When the initiative was announced, agents like Kay from across the Bureau volunteered for temporary assignments in Indian Country.

On the Yakama Reservation, Kay worked a range of investigations, including those related to homicide, missing persons, gangs, and crimes against children.

“You might not work these kinds of violations anywhere else in the FBI,” he said. “For agents working in Indian Country, it’s the closest thing to being a local police detective.”

In another investigation, Kay tried to locate a child sexual assault victim to see if they would be pressing charges. He and a Yakama Police detective met to share updates on the case and went together to the interview. Unfortunately, the victim wasn’t home, so Kay left his phone number and hoped for a call back. He also drove around the reservation hoping to find the victim before heading back to the FBI office in Yakama.

The assignment to Indian Country has been eye-opening, he said. It’s given him an opportunity to work closely with Native American partners in a part of the country where the mission is so crit-

ical.

There are multiple tribal detectives Kay now works with regularly, having quickly established a rapport. “You investigate crime scenes, generate leads, conduct interviews, and make arrests,” Kay said. “All of this is done in partnership with the tribal and local law enforcement.”

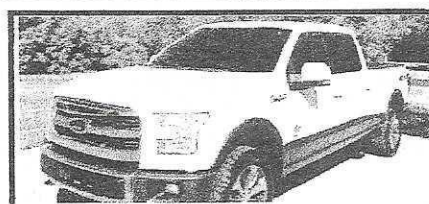

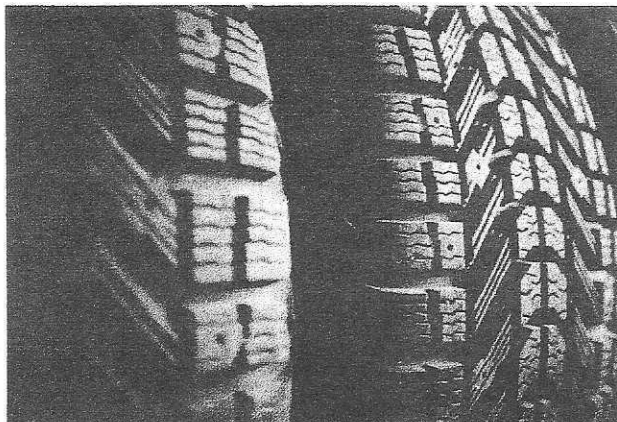
