

Large-Scale Cocaine Supplier Sentenced in Drug Trafficking Conspiracy

A Jamaican national was sentenced today to over six years in prison for conspiracy to distribute five kilograms or more of cocaine.

According to court documents, from January through December 2019, Caswell Richards, 56, regularly supplied kilograms of cocaine to distributors in the Washington D.C. metropolitan area. Over the course

the conspiracy, Richards distributed at least 15 kilograms of cocaine to his co-conspirators. He distributed cocaine in Maryland through a middleman, Hopeton Fletcher, 53, of Gaithersburg, Maryland. Richards insulated himself from law enforcement detection by arranging transac-tions with Fletcher, who would then communicate directly with distributor cocaine

Orekoya, who was supplied with cocaine by numerous individuals in addition to Richards, distributed cocaine in the Eastern District of Virginia, as well as other locations throughout the D.C. metropolitan area from January 2017 through December 2019.

Agg. Assault

Jerry Beckett, 50 Hines Valley Road Lenoir City, was charged with Aggravated Assault.

Deputy Davis LCSO, responded to Highway 70 West. In reference to a fight between to employees at the Wampler's Farm Sausage parking lot. Upon arrival, Deputy made contact with the victim. The victim had very large swelling and bruising to the left side of his face. Victim's left eye was swollen shut and also had a busted top and bottom lip. Victim advised he was assaulted by Jerry Beckett. Victim advised Jerry left the scene prior to deputy arrival. The victim advised himself and Jerry were arguing about work responsibilities in the factory line of Wampler's Farm Sausage. Victim advised Jerry followed him out to the parking lot after he clocked out

for the day. Victim advised the argument continued after himself and Jerry reached their vehicles. Victim stated Jerry exited his car and proceeded to opening his truck door without consent. Victim stated Jerry punched him approximately 4 to 5 times in the face and also kicked him in the left

Two males witnessed the altercation and consented to giving a written statement. Family transported the victim to the Fort Loudon Medical Center for medical aid. Deputy made contact with the staff at Fort Loudon Medical Center, and they advised the victim had a non-displaced facial fracture. This injury caused severe pain and deformation to the left side of Bryan's face. A warrant has been generated for aggravated assault for Jerry Beckett, due to the serious bodily injuries obtained by the victim. This incident occurred in Loudon County Tennessee.





DUI

Bradley Walker, 36, Timber Grove Drive Knoxville, was charged with DUI, and Financial Responsibility Law.

Deputy L. Hawkins LCSO, was dispatched to Interstate 40 Westbound at the mile marker 363.8 for a wreck. The caller advised that a white Cadillac sedan failed to maintain its lane and nearly struck other vehicles. The vehicle left its lane of travel and struck the guardrail on the left side of the roadway, at the 363 mile marker. The vehicle swerved off the roadway into the median and came to a stop. Deputy arrived on the scene and observed the Cadillac in the median with one male standing outside of the vehicle. This vehicle displayed a tag of 184BLMH, Deputy advised dispatch of this tag. Dispatch then advised me there was no valid insurance for this vehicle. Deputy

made contact with Bradley Walker, who stated that he was on his way to a friend's party when his vehicle lost control and left the roadway. Mr. Walker appeared confused and was unable to maintain attention when asked for his driver's license. He attempted to prop the vehicle hood up with a windshield wiper blade. The windshield wipers were running and Deputy asked him to turn them off. Despite this being his vehicle he struggled to find the switch to turn them off. Deputy observed damage to the right side of the vehicle consistent with striking the face of a guardrail. On the right side of the vehicle, two large dents could be seen stretching from the front to the rear. However, Mr. Walker was unaware that he has struck a guardrail, stating that there was only "tiny dents" on his vehicle. His eyes

were glossy/bloodshot and his speech was slurred. I conducted S.F.S.Ts. During the testing, Mr. Walker began falling asleep during HGN. S.F.S.Ts were unsatisfactory. He was placed into custody and read the Tennessee implied consent advisement. Mr. Walker consented to provide a blood sample. Moneymakers Wrecker Service arrived on the scene and towed the vehicle. I left

the scene and transported him to The Fort Loudon Medical Center. After the blood draw. the deputy transported him to The Loudon County Jail. In the sally port of the jail, Deputy conducted A.R.I.D.E. Mr. Walker showed signs impairment throughout A.R.I.D.E testing. All of the above did occur in Loudon County, Tennessee.

Joshua Pinar, 32, Wilson Road Loudon, was charged Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. I, and Assisting other Agency.

Deputy Harrison LCSO, observed a green Honda Accord traveling on Fork Creek Road, and upon running the registration, the registered owner's license came back suspended. Deputy conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle on Fork Creek Road just before Calloway Road.

Upon contact with the driver, Joshua Pindar, and the

passenger. Joshua stated his license was suspended. Deputy had Joshua step out and come back to the front of his patrol unit to issue a written warning for the license violation.

Cocaine

Orekoya was sentenced on June 15, 2021, to 195 months of imprisonment for conspiracy to distribute cocaine and firearms trafficking. Fletcher was sentenced on April 19 to 42 months of imprisonment for his role in the conspiracy.

Jessica D. Aber, U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia; Jarod Forget, Special Agent in Charge for the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) Washington Division; and Sarah Linden, Acting Special Agent in Charge of the FBI Criminal and Cyber Division, made the announcement after sentencing by U.S. District Judge Rossie D. Alston.

Special Assistant U.S. Attorney Lauren Hahn and Assistant U.S. Attorney Bibeane Metsch prosecuted the case.

This effort is part of an Organized Crime and Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) operation. OCDETF identifies, disrupts, and dismantles the highest level criminal organization that threaten the United States using a prosecutor-led, intelligence-driven, multi-agency approach. 
Karen Ritter,39, Norwood Road Lenoir City, was charged with Public Intoxication.
