Officer L. Hawkins LPD, was dispatched to McDonald's in reference to a domestic. Charged

Michelle Miller, 49, County Road 319 Sweetwater, was charged with, Simple Possession, Driving on Suspended License, and Tampering/Fabricating with Evidence.

Officer R. Miller, with the Lenoir City Police Department, initiated a traffic stop on a maroon KIA sedan in the area of Highway 321 near United Community Bank in Lenoir City, TN for the displayed registration not coming back on file. Upon the traffic stop the officer made contact with the female driver who was identified as Michelle Miller, of Sweetwater, TN. While speaking with MILLER regarding the registration, she stated that the registration was given to her by a friend who owned the vehicle that she was driving. The officer then ran the displayed VIN located on the front dash of the vehicle which came back to a Virgil of Philadelphia, TN and showed to be unregistered with no current insurance. During the roadside investigation MILLER advised

that she did not have a license and stated that it was suspended. A license check was conducted through central dispatch where they confirmed that MILLER'S license was in fact suspended. The officer also had central dispatch conduct a warrant check on MILLER where they confirmed that MILLER had an active warrant out of Knox County, TN for possession of methamphetamine. As the officer was attempting to place MILLER into custody, Officer E. Carroll, who was assisting on the traffic stop visually observed MILLER place her hand into her bra and pull a bag out and then proceed by placing the bag into her mouth and immediately taking a drink of her sprite in attempts to swallow the bag to destroy the substance. The officer was able to have MILLER spit the bag out which contained a green powder-like substance that she stated was (Clonazepam) but will need to be sent off to the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation for further testing. The green powder-like substance weight is believed to be less than half a gram.

Octavius Lloyd, 47, Kenwood Avenue Baltimore, was charged with, Simple Possession, Resisting Arrest, and Reckless Driving.

Deputy Brockwell LCSO, observed a gray Dodge Challenger (VA registration TVV2235), driven by Octavius Lloyd (the offender) pass him at a high rate of speed going northbound on Interstate 75. When the deputy got behind the vehicle, they were maintaining speeds of 90 plus mph. The vehicle was in the right lane and failed to signal when going to the left lane. The deputy continued to observe the vehicle as it then straddled the dotted line for approximately 10 seconds and once again failing to signal the lane change going into the right lane. When the deputy got behind the vehicle to notify dispatch of the registration, the vehicle slammed

on its breaks and continued with speeds at 45 mph in a posted 70 mph zone. The deputy initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle and spoke with the offender. While speaking to the offender, there was a strong odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. The deputy notified dispatch to send him another unit for a probable cause vehicle search. When I asked Lloyd to step out of the vehicle, he refused to comply with orders. The deputy then notified other units that he had one refusing to step out of the vehicle. The deputy then explained to Lloyd why he was needing him to step out of the vehicle and explained that it was not an option to refuse. Lloyd then asked for a supervisor to arrive on scene so that he would feel safe. The deputy advised Lloyd that a supervisor was already in route and that he needed him to step

out of the vehicle. Lloyd was given multiple commands to exit the vehicle and refused to obey all of them. Loudon City Officer Jenkins arrived on scene. Lloyd stated that he would step out of the car because another officer had arrived. At this time, Lloyd was placed under arrest for resisting arrest and reckless driving. Upon searching the vehicle, a black draw string bag was found in the floorboard of the passenger side containing, 1 Ziploc bag containing marijuana weighing 30.3 grams, 1 clear knotted bag containing marijuana weighing 6.81 grams, 1 clear bag containing 92 unlabeled pills in different colors (sent to TBI for testing). Lloyd was then charged with simple possession of the marijuana. James's towing towed the vehicle from the scene, and the deputy then transported Lloyd to the Loudon County Sheriff's Office. This did

happen in Loudon County, TN without further incident. **Former Tennessee Department of Revenue Employee Indicted after Double-Dipping Scheme**

An investigation by the Tennessee Comptroller's Office has resulted in the indictment of Jeffery Wadding, a former collections officer with the Tennessee Department of Revenue's (TDOR) regional office in Jackson.

The investigation began after TDOR officials reported suspected malfeasance to the Comptroller's Office.

Investigators determined that Wadding improperly received at least \$34,131.47 in wages and employer benefits between June 15, 2022 and October 6, 2023.

Wadding was eligible and approved to work from his residence each day instead of being physically present in the department office. In October 2023, TDOR office Indicted ctd. pg. 5

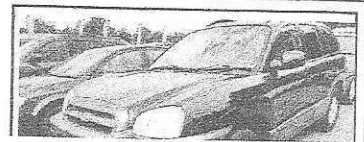

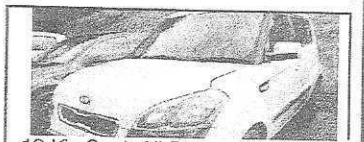

cial became aware that he was working at the Prime Auto USA dealership instead of his approved alternate worksite.

Investigators compared Wadding's TDOR timesheets with his dealership timesheets and found 287 days with an overlap of claimed work time. Wadding received compensation from both entities for the same hours, a practice called double-dipping. The total misappropriated amount includes both unearned salary compensation and payroll benefits.

Wadding admitted to investigators that he performed some work for the dealership while on the clock for TDOR. He was dismissed from the department effective October 20, 2023.

In October 2024, the Madison County Grand Jury indicted Jeffery Wadding on

one count of theft of property over \$10,000; one count of destruction, tampering, or fabrication of a government record; and one count of official misconduct.

"The Department of Revenue should consider changes to its alternative workspace solutions policy to require that employees notify the department if their approved alternate worksite changes," said Comptroller Mumpower. "The department should also verify the hours are being worked at the approved alternate worksite."

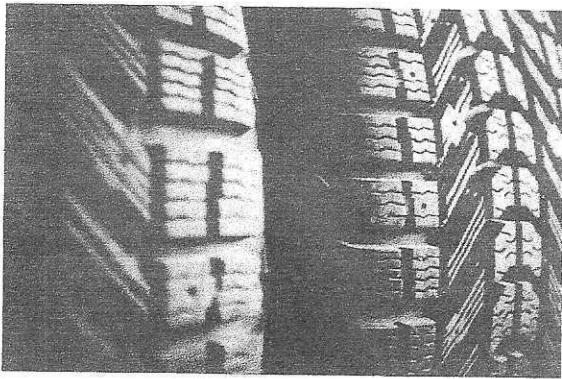
